

LONDON BRIDGE—The busiest and most crowded of all the bridges connects the City with the south of London. It was completed in 1831, at a cost of £2,000,000, under the superintendence of Sir John and George Rennie. In 1903 it was widened, being now 71 ft. broad instead of 54 ft., and a handsome granite balustrade substituted in place of the former solid sides. An extremely good view of the Tower Bridge can be obtained from here, while both interest and amusement can be gained by watching the various steamers which start in the summer for seaside resorts, etc.
