Imperial Commissioners. Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal was appointed the chairman of the colonial section of the Royal Commission in London. The Canadian Commission, which had charge of the collection, transportation and arrangement of the Canadian exhibits, was composed as follows: Chairman, Hon. Sydney Fisher, Minister of Agriculture; Honorary High Commissioner, Hon. J. Israel Tarte, Minister of Public Works; Commission who are in Paris are Hon. Mr. Tarte, Major Gourdeau, J. X. Perreault, James G. Jardine and Wm. D. Scott. In charge of the principal exhibits, however, are officials from the various departments represented, whom the Government have sent to Paris to look after the installation and arrangement of the collections in their respective sections.

The Canadian pavilion is divided into two principal compartments by an open
