news media communications; and (d) the design, production and administration of exhibits for all departments and agencies; counsels the Treasury Board Secretariat on the information and public relations-programs and budgets of various departments; advises Treasury Board on the development of systems and methods of evaluating the effectiveness of government information programs and participates, as required, in the development of an evaluation methodology; directs the planning and development of information research policies and programs; acts as Director General in the latter's absence.

### **REFUSAL OF VISA TO KONSTANTIN GUEIVANDOV**

#### Question No. 408-Mr. Cossitt:

1. Has the government refused a re-entry visa to Soviet journalist Mr. Konstantin Gueivandov and, if so, was the reason given that his activities when previously in Canada were not related to his work as a journalist?

2. What is a full and complete description of all such activities, including dates and places, that caused the government to take this step?

3. Were any Canadian citizens or residents of Canada involved in activities objected to by the government on the part of Mr. Gueivandov and, if so, who were these persons?

Hon. Robert K. Andras (Minister of Manpower and Immigration): 1. Yes, Mr. Konstantin Gueivandov was refused a visa to re-enter Canada because some of his actions were not related to his work as a journalist.

What are the names of all Soviet journalists presently in Canada with valid visas and what are the names and addresses of the news media that they represent in this country?

Hon. Robert K. Andras (Minister of Manpower and Immigration): The news media representatives of the Soviet Union presently in Canada reside in Ottawa. They are I. I. Mironov of Tass, A. Palladine of Novesti Press and V. K. Kurnikov of The State Television and Radio network.

### PURCHASE OF TULIP BULBS FOR OTTAWA

Question No. 410-Mr. Haliburton:

1. How many tulip bulbs are purchased each year for Ottawa?

2. How many years are the bulbs re-used?

3. When the bulbs are disposed of, are they sold by public tender or destroyed and, if destroyed (a) what is the manner of so doing (b) what is the cost?

Hon. Ron Basford (Minister of State for Urban Affairs): I am informed by the National Capital Commission as follows: 1. Approximately 200,000 to 250,000 tulip bulbs are purchased each year by the NCC. The number varies depending upon which priority floral display areas are replanted.

2. There are four major priority floral display areas, they are Dow's Lake, Parliament Hill, 24 Sussex and Rideau

Hall. These beds are normally replanted every second year. If the first year display is poor they will be replaced the next fall, conversely if the second year display is particularly good they will be kept a third year. The other floral displays are replanted when necessary every three or four years.

3. The tulip bulbs are heeled in after they are removed in the spring, sorted during the summer and the flower size bulbs are replanted in the fall in the secondary floral display areas such as the borders along the Driveway system. (a) The remaining bulbs, which are too small to produce a flower are buried. (b) Approximately \$250.
