NEWSPRINT DISTRIBUTION RESEARCH

Question No. 39-Mr. Hellyer:

1. Has the Department of Industry, Trade and Commerce undertaken a study entitled "Newsprint Distribution Research"?

2. Does the planned research include all newsprint origins in Eastern Canada or just some and, if the latter, which ones?

3. What is the estimated cost of the study?

What are the names and qualifications of the principal personnel engaged in the study?

5. Has any computer time been purchased and, if so, from what companies or institutions?

Mr. Raynald Guay (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): 1. As part of the government's strategy to improve the international competitiveness of Canada's pulp and paper industry, the Department of Industry, Trade and Commerce is contributing to the cost of an investigation of possible methods of reducing distribution costs for the movement of newsprint from Eastern Canada to customers in the United States. Marketing is not included. Under the Trade/Industrial Program, contributions are being made to the Canadian National Railways and to Newsprint Distribution Research, which are conducting separate parts of the investigation at arms length. Newsprint Distribution Research is a non-profit association established on May 1, 1973, to carry out the investigation. Principals are a group of five newsprint companies operating mills in Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba and Newfoundland: Anglo-Canadian Pulp and Paper Mills Limited, The Price Company Limited, Domtar Limited, Abitibi Paper Company Limited, Consolidated-Bathurst Limited.

2. The study covers newsprint originating in mills of the principals. Subsequently, if results indicate significant economies, all newsprint producers in Eastern Canada will be invited to participate in the formation of a co-operative distribution organization.

3. Estimated cost of the project is expected to total about \$1 million of which the Crown is contributing approximately \$500 thousand. The government portion is repayable if the project results lead to the formation of a distribution organization.

4. The Chairman of Newsprint Distribution Research is Mr. J. P. Lunderville, Vice-President, Engineering, Purchasing and Transportation, Domtar Limited. Mr. S. French, seconded from Domtar Limited where he was Director of Transportation, is full time Project Director. Both have many years experience in the manufacture and distribution of forest products. The Project Director of the Canadian National section of the project is Mr. Walter Wynne, a senior rail systems planning specialist with the railroad. 5. No computer time has been purchased to date.

CLOSURE OF POST OFFICES IN ONTARIO

Question No. 42-Mr. Cossitt:

1. How many post offices have been closed by the government in the Province of Ontario since April 20, 1968?

2. In what municipality and in what electoral district are each of these post offices located?

Hon. André Ouellet (Postmaster General): 1. April 1968-September 1970, 327; October 1970-Present, 55. The program to close small post offices ended in September 1970. Closings since that date are due to factors such as inauguration of letter carrier or rural delivery to meet public request, amalgamation of communities, dwindling populations, inability to recruit replacement on death or retirement of former postmaster, etc.
