**LACROSSE IN LONDON WILL BOOM NEXT YEAR**

Not Discouraged Over Defeat at Weston, Says President Johnston.

LONDON, Ont., Oct. 6.—"London will have two intermediate teams next season," said ex-Ald. E. H. Johnston, president of the local club, when he returned from Toronto after witnessing the game at Weston. "London is gradually warming up to the game, and while the support tendered the team this season was not as good as we would have liked, it was nevertheless encouraging. I believe we can put a championship team in the field next season. We will also have another team in order to have games every Saturday. I am sure that lacrosse will boom here then."

Mr. Johnston was in earnest when he made the above statement. Far from being discouraged by the small crowds that have turned out to witness the games in London this season, the local club is planning to do things on a larger scale next year. All of this season's players will be available for next year, and a lot of new material will be developed.

Manager Mike Collins is confident that had a sudden death game been played against Weston, London would have been meeting Bracebridge in the finals this week instead of the West Toronto suburb. The local players always play better away from home. They held Weston to a tie in the first half of the game there Saturday, while Weston obtained a big lead in the first two quarters here.

There has been more lacrosse in London this season than ever before in the history of the city. The Public Schools League has done much to boost the game here, and also serves to develop the youngsters. Mr. Johnston introduced the game to the local schools, and has been untiring in his efforts to fan the flames of interest and put it on a sound footing. He has spent a great deal of time and money in reviving the game here, and he is confident that in a short time his efforts and those of the other men who are also striving to boost the game locally will be crowned with success.

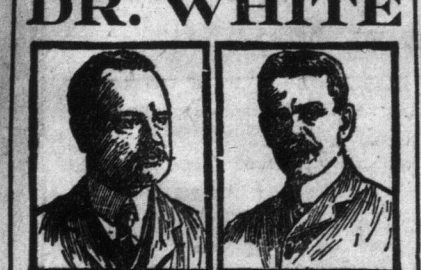
