Paris, Sept. 10.—According to L'Eclair Emperor William of Germany has been extremely profuse in his generosity to high officers, princes and other high dignitaries in his bestowal of the White and red guards in Finland to join in their operations on the Murman coast emphasizes the difficulties the Germans face in the attempt to block the allied forces there.

For some time the Germans have sought to compel the Finns and the Belsheviki to arrange a treaty to give the Bolsheviki the Kola peninsula.
