THANKS TO GOLDWIN SMITH

Members of University Commission Express Appreciation.

The members of the university commission have concluded their labors and the report is now in possession of the government. Prior to dissolution it was moved by Sir William Meredith and seconded by B. E. Walker, that: "The commissioners, having concluded their labors, desire before separating, to record an expression of their sense of deep obligation to Mr. Goldwin Smith, one of their number, for his courtesy and kindness in putting the Grange at their service as the meeting place of the commission. It is in their opinion fitting that this official record should be made, because it is not infrequently the case that the public service that has been rendered by making it possible for the commission to conduct its enquiry and deliberations with the privacy that was essential to the work upon which it was engaged."

PROVINCE OWNS POWER.

Claim of George T. Marks Will Have to Be Considered.

The Ontario government is a claimant for the valuable power site on the Current River, claimed by George T. Marks and the Town of Port Arthur. A bill to incorporate the Current River Power Co. was before the private bills committee yesterday, when Hon. Adam Beck made the claim on behalf of the government. The property is included in the report of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario.

Mr. Marks claimed that he bought the rights in 1885. Owing to the government's claim, consideration of the bill was laid over.

The Kakabeka Falls dispute was also before the committee. It will be further discussed to-day.

YORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS

Toronto Junction, April 5.—The council met in special session this afternoon. The fire limit bylaw was discussed. It is proposed to place High Park-avenue, all of Dundas-street, and 100 yards on each side, as far as Low-street, in class A. All of Ward 3, the central portion of the town and Davenport-road with 100 feet on other side; all of the outskirts of the town with the exception of Evelyn-crescent and that portion of the town in the vicinity of Conduit-street, in Class C. This latter class permits of the erection of frame dwellings a certain distance from the road, but the owners will have to keep them looking neat. The council will go before the railway commission on the 17th, to place before it the difficulty in having so many sidings on the north side of the town.

York Chapter, No. 62, G.R.C., met last night, when Past Grand Superintendent R. J. Gibson was presented with the regalia of his office by the grand superintendent.

County Constable Steward delivered invitation to-day to Messrs. H. G. Stone, Merton-street, and John G. Kleiberger, Beresford-avenue, to spend an hour or so with His Worship Peter Elliot, to give their reasons for riding bicycles on the sidewalks in Deer Park. Chief Walmesley intends also to enforce the town's bylaw regarding bicycle riding on the sidewalks.

York Township Council intends fighting the bill before the legislature concerning the representation of municipalities at the county council. At present the officials claim that York Township, according to population, which is 4400, is entitled to have a greater representation than will be given by the act.

The regular Lenten service was conducted to-night by Rev. Dr. Osborne, and will be continued until next Thursday evening.

The Beach Presbyterians will hold service in the Balmby Beach Club house on Sunday morning and evening, pending the removal of the present church building.

The athletic section of the B.B. Club will hold a dance in the assembly hall on April 20.

The roads and bridges committee will meet to-morrow night.

Lloydstown.
The death took place Tuesday morning at Galloway, Virginia, the residence of her daughter, of Mrs. Arthur Armstrong. Deceased was the eldest daughter of the late Richard Lippincott Denison, of overcourt, on Dundas-street, and had been twice married. Her first husband was the late Hugh C. Thompson, secretary to the board of agriculture, who died in 1877. Four years later she married for the second time, Arthur Armstrong, of Glinockie, Lloydstown, who died in March, 1905. Mrs. Armstrong had left two daughters, Mrs. Guernsey of Virginia, and Mrs. Herbert Murchison, of Toronto.

SOLDIERS EAT EACH OTHER.

Fifty Thousand Lives Lost During a Siege.

Mr. Leland Buxton, who has just returned to England from a tour of several months along the Persian Gulf, gives a terrible account of the effects of the siege of the rebels of Sana by the Turkish troops.

He informed Reuters' representative that on his way from Hodeida to the capital he found the villages had been destroyed by the Turkish artillery, and that a great proportion of the route was entirely depopulated. Skeletons and skulls marred the route.

Sana, which has magnificent buildings, and is surrounded by mud walls, had its population reduced from 70,000 to 20,000 during the siege. There was terrible suffering, and cannibalism occurred both among the Arabs and the

Turks.

One Turk admitted that he had killed and eaten three Arabs. The dogs, which are a characteristic feature of most eastern towns, had disappeared, both they and the cats having been used as food.

A European in Sana is an Italian trader, who was in the place throughout the siege, and who has lived there for twenty years.

Among Waxworks. From St. Paul's they were taken to Tussauds, a place which filled them with infinite dread. They regarded it as the most terrible example of the bloodthirsty instincts of the British, and they felt that to doff them would be a mark of respect.
