Washington, Oct. 2.—Insurance commissioners from all over the United States assembled here to-day in their fifth annual convention. In his address President James V. Barry said: "The time will never come when the companies will be successfully managed either by state or supervision. More actual good has been accomplished by the publicity incident to the Armstrong committee investigation than will ever be accomplished by the Armstrong laws, so-called, and this observation is not meant to be in any sense a reflection on the present New York enactments. I simply desire to emphasize my belief in publicity rather than in legislation directed to cover every detail, as an effective remedy for evils of whatever nature."

Manager Hawkins of the Cataract Company complained that his company had been unfairly treated. Some of the aldermen jumped on him, declaring that although the company was bound under its present contract to supply a 2000 candle-power arc lamp it supplied only a 400 candle-power lamp.
