KING MAY COME IN 1909 TO OPEN QUEBEC BRIDGE

Three-Hundredth Anniversary of Founding of the City May Be Put Off a Year If His Majesty Will Honor Us With His Presence.

Montreal, Oct. 26.—(Special).—Will King Edward come to Quebec to attend the three hundredth anniversary of the founding of that city, if the event is postponed till 1909, when the bridge will also be opened?

Ulric Barthe, the secretary of the bridge, says: "It is absolutely useless to expect that the Quebec bridge will be completed in 1908. It is quite probable that the bridge will be ready by 1909, but not before."

"There is another reason for the delay. The visit of Edward VIII. is greatly to be desired, and if the opening of the bridge could be made to coincide with the 500th anniversary of the King of England would be more likely to come to Quebec."

C. N. R. BONDS SOLD.

Mr. Mackenzie Returns From Successful Mission to London.

Montreal, Oct. 26.—(Special).—William Mackenzie, president of the Canadian Northern Railway, arrived in Quebec to-day per C.P.R. steamer Empress of Ireland.

Mr. Mackenzie said that his trip to London had been highly successful, and that he has fully accomplished his object. While in London he sold practically four per cent. debenture stock of the Canadian Northern of Quebec to the amount of one million pounds sterling.

Mr. Mackenzie is delighted with the new C.P.R. boats. He stated that he left Toronto on Sept. 20 and dined in London on Sept. 25. Returning he left Oct. 19 and will breakfast in Toronto Oct. 27.

NOT JUST TO FORGE ON WEST TENTATIVE AGREEMENT OF MANY YEARS AGO.

R. L. Borden Takes Up Gauntlet Thrown Down by Mr. Aylesworth and Defends His Opposition to Northwest School Clauses—Not Opposed to Separate Schools.

Kincardine, Oct. 26.—(Special).—R. L. Borden was the chief speaker at a great Conservative rally in the opera house to-night. The theatre was filled to the doors, and the utmost enthusiasm prevailed.

Col. Hugh Clark, M.L.A. for North Bruce, also spoke. Mr. Locombe, K. C., was chairman, and also on the platform were Mayor Temple and Rev. Messrs. Ryan and Miles.

Colonel Clark spoke of the record of the government as one of a series of practically uninterrupted broken promises. They had promised economy, but the only instance of economy had been of Hon. Clifford Sifton, who, out of his small salary as minister of the interior, had been able to save a million dollars.

Mr. Borden dealt with the prosperity cry, the school question, and the scandals which had alarmed the country. He had challenged the government to place a finger upon one act of theirs which had been conducive to the present prosperity.

Mr. Borden said he had not desired to touch upon this matter. Hon. Mr. Aylesworth had, however, thrown down the gauntlet and he was forced to take it up, and to repeat what he had contended for in the House of Commons.

NO PLAIN CLOTHES MEN ALL WILL DON UNIFORM

New York Police Commissioner Issues Sweeping Order Which May Cause Resignations.

New York, Oct. 26.—A police order, almost, if not quite, as sweeping as that of Wednesday, which directed the transfer of every captain in Greater New York, with one exception, was issued by Police Commissioner Bingham to-day.

Under the new order every plain clothes man in the city will don a uniform at 6 o'clock to-night, and in future the power of captains in assigning any man to plain clothes duty will be limited. The order threatens to do away with plain clothes men, otherwise known as "wardmen."

Such appointments as are made must be made through inspectors. Reports, too, must be made of arrests and of the disposition of the cases by the magistrate.

Many retirements from the force are looked for on account of the order. Many men have been on plain clothes duty for six or more years.

FOUR DAYS ON SEA VOYAGE WITH HALIFAX TERMINAL DREAM OF MONTREALER

Sir George A. Drummond, Home From Britain, Says Faster Boats and Improved Land Service Will Prove Superiority of Canadian Route.

Montreal, Oct. 26.—(Special).—"I want still faster boats, and if the federal government would only grant running powers over the Intercolonial Railway from Halifax to Montreal to both the Canadian Pacific and the Grand Trunk, the problem of a four-days Atlantic sea voyage from Canada to Great Britain would be solved."

Sir George A. Drummond, president of the Bank of Montreal, returned to-day from England, more firmly convinced than ever of the soundness of the policy of utilizing Halifax as the all-the-year-round Canadian seaport for a fast steamship line between the Dominion and the motherland.

Sir George had been discussing the matter with Lord Strathcona, and while the high commissioner is strongly in favor of a 24 knot service on the lines just indicated, Sir George thinks that the object can be obtained with ships of a little less speed.

He had never before crossed in such fine boats as the Empresses, but he says we must have faster ships and more of them. The present time on the I. C. R. can be cut down very considerably and with the faster ships to Halifax, New York will be outdistanced completely.

N. S. SHIP FOUNDERS.

Barquentine Milton Believed to Have Been Lost in Gulf of Mexico.

Halifax, N.S., Oct. 26.—(Special).—The barquentine Milton, Captain Jan. Manthorn, owned in Liverpool, N.S., on her passage from Havana to Mobile, has been out 33 days, and as the trip should be made in six days all hopes for her safe arrival are given up.

The Milton was in ballast, and it is supposed she foundered with all on board. She was fully insured.
