THREE DEAD, FIVE MISSING IN COLLAPSE OF NEW PIER

Two Storey Structure Goes Down, Sending Tremendous Wave Across Harbor.

BALTIMORE, April 27.—With a roar that terrified thousands and a rush that drove a wave six feet high to distant parts of the inner harbor of Baltimore, nearly half of a new pier under construction at Locust Point today broke away from the shore end and plunged into the water.

Three dead bodies have been taken from the wreckage, five men are missing and their bodies are almost certainly beneath the ruins, and eighteen men are suffering from injuries more or less serious.

The dead includes Howard L. Elender, civil engineer. The missing are laborers.

It is not certain why the catastrophe occurred. The new pier was being built by the Baltimore Bridge Co., and the McLean Contracting Co., for the Eastmore and Ohio Railroad, and was to have been used by the steamers of the Johnson Line. It was a two-storey structure, 300 feet long, about 500 feet of which was on the pier.

Were Fleeting to Safety.

The water end was built upon piles, upon which a thick bed of concrete was laid and above this the superstructure of steel. The water section of the pier was approaching completion, and was under way when the water end was almost ready to be raised into place by a heavy fire wall of masonry. This morning cracklings were heard, and the workmen were called to places of safety. Just as many of them were struggling thru the doors in the fire wall, this collapsed, and with 400 feet of the water end, the pier plunged into the harbor, carrying a number of men with it. Elender, the civil engineer, who was acting superintendent for the McLean Contracting Co., lost his life in an effort to warn the men of their danger. His body was recovered, and the bodies of two others, including Mayor E. Clay Timanus, responded quickly to calls for help, and everything possible was done to aid the injured and recover the bodies of the dead.

PLOT TO SEIZE THE YUKON
Laughed at by People of the West as a Stupid Story.

WINNIPEG, Man., April 28.—(Special.)—The West is laughing over a sensational story published in last week's Canadian Courier about the Order of the Midnight Sun being organized by Americans to seize the Yukon, and about the plot being frustrated thru the alertness of the mounted police. In the Canadian West there are hundreds of members of this mystic brotherhood, which essentially is a Canadian organization along the lines of the Elks. The first condition is, and always was, that a member should reside at least a year in the Yukon. One of the chief, if not the chief spirit of the Order of the Midnight Sun is Hon. W. L. Walsh, now a lawyer in Calgary, and member of the firm of McCarthy & Walsh. He is an Ontario lawyer and probably one of the best known members in the West, having practiced for years in the good old Orange county of Dufferin. He is proud of his membership and ridicules the stupid story. The Brotherhood of the Midnight Sun is about as capable of hatching a plot against Canadian authority as would be the Zorra municipality.
