South Sea Islands Swept by a Destructive Storm, Carrying With It Havoc.

NATIVES CLIMBED TALL TREES

Miles Into the Sea to Reach Rescuing Ships.

San Francisco, Feb. 8.-News of a fearful loss of life in a destructive storm that swept over the south seaislands last month, reached here today by the steamer Mariposa, direct from Tahiti. The loss of life is esti-

mated at 1000 persons. Jan. 13 last a huge tidal wave, accompanied by a terrific hurricane, attacked the Society Islands and the Puamoto group with fearful force, causing death and devastation never before equalled in a land of dreaded storms. The storm raged several days, reaching its maximum strength between Jan. 14 and Jan. 16. From the meagre news received at Tahiti up to the time of the sailing of the Mariposa it is estimated that 1000 of the islanders lost their lives. It is feared that later advices will increase this num-

First News Jan. 26. The first news of the disaster reached Papeete, Tahiti, Jan. 26, by the schooner Eimeo. The captain of the schooner placed the fatalities at 500. The steamer Excelsior arrived at Papete the following day with 400 survivors. The captain of the Excelsior estimated the total loss of life to be 800. These figures comprised only the deaths on three islands of Hao, Hikurira and Makokaa whose ordinary éra, and Makokaa, whose ordinary population is 1800.
