

Company Yield Everything Strikers in Montreal Win

Men May Have a Union and Unionists Will Not Be Discriminated Against—Ten Per Cent. Increase in Wages Granted.

Montreal, Feb. 8.—(Special.)—As intimated in The Sunday World, the Montreal Street Railway strike is now a thing of the past. A severe snow storm, which has been raging all day, makes the service a little irregular, but the first car left the Court-street shops at 1 o'clock this morning. The start-up was greeted with cheers by the conductors and motormen who were standing near.

TORONTO MEN SEEKING ARBITRATION

Mass Meeting Early Sunday Morning Discusses Grievances Against the Toronto Railway Company.

Four hours were consumed Sunday morning by the street car employes in the discussion of their differences with the company. There were 731 members of the union present. The chief source of conversation was the refusal of the company to reinstate Electrical Worker McCarroll.

The meeting was unanimous in expressing the view that the company had discharged McCarroll because he is a union man, that he must be reinstated or the case submitted to arbitration, and that the minor officials of the company must cease their efforts to disrupt the union.

The report of the mass meeting and the situation as it has progressed will be forwarded to-day to the chief officials of the Amalgamated Association. It is unlikely that another mass meeting will be necessary for several days.

ONE THOUSAND DROWNED BY HIGHLY TIDAL WAVE

South Sea Islands Swept by a Destructive Storm, Carrying With It Havoc.

NATIVES CLIMBED TALL TREES

Four Hundred Survivors Swim Four Miles Into the Sea to Reach Rescuing Ships.

San Francisco, Feb. 8.—News of a fearful loss of life in a destructive storm that swept over the southern islands last month, reached here today by the steamer Mariposa, direct from Tahiti. The loss of life is estimated at 1000 persons.

Jan. 18 last a huge tidal wave, accompanied by a terrific hurricane, attacked the Society Islands and the Tuamotou group with fearful force, causing death and devastation never before equaled in a land of dread storms. The storm raged several days, reaching its maximum strength between Jan. 14 and Jan. 16.

Survivors Lack Food.

The surviving inhabitants are left destitute of food, shelter and clothing, all having been swept away by the storm. The French government, upon receipt of the news of the disaster, took prompt measures to relieve the distressed districts, and despatched two warships with food supplies.

Swam Four Miles.

The four hundred survivors brought by the Excelsior, were taken to the ship's side by swimming three and four miles from the tops of coconut trees.
