LEGAL RULINGS

Western Ontario Cases Dealt With at Osgoode Hall.

The following judgments were rendered yesterday at Osgoode Hall: Stratford Gas Company vs. City of Stratford—Judgment on appeal by plaintiffs from judgment of Street, J., dismissing the action, which was brought to recover \$4,000.50 for 32 night's loss of profits for reason of the plaintiffs not taking and not paying for lights for those nights under the contract between the plaintiffs and the defendants. Held that the plaintiffs were not entitled to recover. Appeal dismissed with costs.

Young vs. Tucker—Judgment on appeal by plaintiffs from order of drainage referee, dismissing the plaintiffs' claim of costs. The plaintiffs claim the damages occasioned by the discharge of water upon their land, viz., the east half of lot 10 in the 1st con. of the township of Moore, and a mandamus to compel defendant to provide a proper outlet for the water brought down by drains constructed by him. Held that defendant was responsible for the water brought into the ponds or reservoir, but the damage was trivial. Appeal allowed with costs, and judgment to be entered for plaintiffs, with costs for an injunction and \$250 damages.

The appeal in the case of Eliza McCarthy vs. Proctor, of Goderich, was dismissed by the Court of Appeal. The appeal was based on the contention that a will supposed to have been made by her late husband, George McCarthy, was forged. This question was left half of the estate to his nephew and was made days after another, by which he left his entire property to his wife. The peculiar feature of the affair was that, although the first will was signed, the second was marked only. The evidence was meager and conflicting. The judges agreed Chancellor Boyd had given a proper judgment in the case.

The China Blue-Book

Which Has Been Issued by the British Foreign Office

Indicates an Understanding Between Germany and the United States.

Why the Italian Minister at Peking Was Recalled.

Proposed Army Increase Rejected by the Reichstag—Medical Scandal—Accident to Prince Henry.

CHINA BLUE BOOK.

London, March 10.—The eagerly anticipated China blue book was issued last evening, but all the main points in the dispatches, filling 360 pages, and covering the period from February, 1898, to February, 1899, were already known to the public. The blue book deals at length with the territorial railway and mining concessions to all countries, commencing with the cession of Port Arthur, and closing with the opening of Nan-Ning as a treaty port. Much space is devoted to the question of the foreign concession at Shanghai the exhibits including the protests of American minister and consul against the placing of American property under the jurisdiction of France or any other single power. The readiness of British warships to support the victors in resisting the French demands is also displayed; and the blue book gives the American-Chinese development companies' contract for the Han-Kow-Canton railway, signed in Washington, April 14, 1898.

The whole tenor of the British dispatches shows a desire to meet the views of Germany and the United States in all matters in which they were concerned.

THE OPEN DOOR.

At the annual meeting of the Associated Chambers of Commerce, Hon. Sir Henry Stafford Northcote, presiding, a resolution was passed urging the British Government to obtain the "open door" in China and prior British right in the Yang Tse Kiang Valley.

Major Flood Page, in behalf of the London Chamber of Commerce, moved a resolution expressing satisfaction at the "cordial and closer relations with the United States," and urging her Majesty's Government to "utilize every opportunity conducive to the maintenance of the feeling of security of the vast commercial and financial connections of the two nations." The resolution of Major Flood Page was adopted unanimously.

UNITED ACTION.

The Shanghai correspondent of the Times says: The British and American associations have convened a joint meeting for Thursday to advocate united action by the two governments in settling the question of extending the cosmopolitan settlement.

The London Post says that Russia will reinforce her fleet in Chinese waters by the addition of four battleships, six cruisers, and two gunboats, depleting her Baltic forces in order to do so.

ITALY'S COURSE.

In the Italian Chamber of Deputies Admiral Canova, minister of foreign affairs, made a comprehensive statement regarding Italy's action in China. He confirmed the reported call of Signor Martino, Italian minister at Peking, and announced that Italy had obtained the approval of Great Britain and Japan before demanding the concession at San Sun. Great Britain, however, had requested, he said, that force should not be employed, and had promised in return to give her diplomatic support to Italy at the court of Peking. Other friendly powers, the minister continued, were then notified, and indicated their acquiescence.

Signor Martino's action had been disapproved because his ultimatum contravened an agreement with England that only in the event of Sir Claude MacDonald (British minister at Peking) being unable to induce the Chinese foreign office to take back Signor Martino's first note should Italy resume liberty of action in order to obtain reparation. He expressed confidence in the ultimate success of Italy's policy. Italy's duty was to refrain from force so far as possible, since she had gone to China without any previous provocative incident or violated rights to justify a resort to violence, which might disturb the international equilibrium in the far east, and exercise a fatal reflex in Europe, besides injuring Great Britain, who had proved herself Italy's partial friend.

WILLIAM VS. THE REICHSTAG.

There is a gap between the amount the German emperor asks in the military bill and the sum the reichstag budget committee desires to grant. Wilhelm threatens dissolution of parliament if his demands are refused.

A SCANDAL.

Germany promises to have a medical scandal. In the reichstag, Herr Abbe Von Peppenhein denounced the methods employed at the University of Breslau, asserting that Dr. Neisser, professor of skin diseases, had inoculated persons with serum for purposes of experiment. Dr. Bosse, minister of education, promised that the abuse would be stopped at once.

PRINCE HENRY HURT.

According to a special dispatch from Shanghai, Prince Henry of Prussia, commander of the German squadron in Chinese waters, while witnessing the launching of a trading vessel, was struck on the head by a plank, which fell from the rafters of the shed under which he was standing. The wound being profusely, but the skull was not injured.

Sir Claude MacDonald, British minister at Peking, owing to his state of health, will take a short leave of absence from Peking and come to London.

DOINGS AT THE CAPITAL

Oliver Provost's Case Settled—To Be Hanged on St. Patrick's Day—Two New Senators Appointed.

[C. P. R. Special to The Advertiser.]

Ottawa, Ont., March 15.—An order in council was approved today allowing the law to take its course in the case of Oliver Provost, now in jail at Port Arthur, for the murder of two Frenchmen who kept a piggy near Port Arthur. Provost is to be hanged on Friday next, March 17.

Dr. Burgess, of Montreal, and Dr. Phelan, of Toronto, who were appointed by the minister of justice to look into the mental condition of the prisoner, have reported that while he is subject to hallucinations, he is responsible. Provost was taken from the insane ward of the Kingston penitentiary, and put on trial. It was in consequence of this fact, which was not submitted to the jury in the way of evidence, that an inquiry has been made into Provost's condition.

TWO NEW SENATORS.

Two new senators have been appointed. Peter McSweeney, of Moncton, N. B., has been appointed to take the place of the late Senator Adams. Mr. McSweeney is a prominent lumberman and has taken an active part in public affairs for many years.

The vacancy in Ontario has been filled by the appointment of Wm. Kerr, of Cobourg, who represented West Northumberland in the Dominion Parliament from 1872 to 1878. At the general election of 1878 he was defeated by St. James Cockburn by a few votes. Mr. Kerr is 63 years of age. He was called to the bar in 1859.

There were a large number of applicants for the position, most of them west of Toronto. The fact that there are a preponderance of senators from West Ontario no doubt helped the government to decide in favor of Mr. Kerr. This fills all the vacancies in the senate, with the exception of Senator Sutherland's seat in Manitoba, which will probably be formally declared vacant this session. Until that is done no appointment can be made.

When parliament opens, Mr. Bell, the new member for Prince Edward, will move the address in the Commons, and Mr. Martineau, who succeeds Mr. Choquette, in Montmagny, will second it.
