In this connection three or four Canadian firms would unite in paying the salary and defraying the expenses of one buyer, sharing benefit and obligation alike. In some cases, too, these firms had been in the habit of sending their own buyers to England at

American Proposition for Permanent Court.

The Hague, Aug. 22.—The text of the bitration has been completed in an agreement with Germany and Great Britain, and will come up for discussion Aug. 28. It consists of 26 articles. The first article records the desire of the signatory powers to organize and "International high court of justice easily accessible and free of charge, with judges representing the various systems of law of the world, and capable of insuring a continuation of ar-

bitration by jurisprudence." The second provides that the judges must be "juris-consults of known comcould not be reached through the big petence in international law, selected steel doors, the guards turned on them so far as possible from the members from the windows streams of water of the permanent court of arbitra-

According to the third and fourth articles, the judges are appointable for terms of twelve years, and will enjoy diplomatic privileges, and immunities while exercising their functions. Article five provides that the court

shall consist of seventeen judges, nine forming a quorum. Article six allots the points to the various nations.

Article seven provides that the high court yearly shall appoint three judges with three substitutes, constituting a special tribunal, which can if necessary try cases elsewhere than at The

Hague Article eight says that the presiden: of the court shall be elected every three years by a majority of the

votes Article nine deals with the payment of the judges. The amounts are not fixed, but the proposal contemplates a fixed yearly salary, besides special remuneration when engaged in cases, and traveling expenses.

Article nineteen provides "that each party shall be entitled to have its own judge to participate in the trial of cases submitted to the court. If a special tribunal acts as a commission of inquiry even a person not connected

with the court can participate in trial" Articles twenty, twenty-one and twenty-two deal with the court pro cedure, and the calling of witnesses. Articles twenty-three and twenty-

four empower the court to establish its own rules. Article twenty-five proposes the ratification of the convention at The Hague as quickly as possible. Article twenty-six proposed to establish the duration of the conven-

tion, but the term is not yet fixed. Any
