HELD UNTIL DROWNED

London, May 30 .- In their initial onslaught Monday the Germans are believed to have used more tanks than ever before, says Reuter's cor-respondent with the British forces on the French front writing Wed-

The 50th British division near Craonne Withstood a gas attack of three hours, and held the Germans in the attempt to reach the Aisne until "the men were drowned under the German combers." The same fate overtook the French division to the right of the 50th. After falling back the 50th made a gallant attempt to recapture Craonne, but was defeated by machine gun fire from the enemy tanks. In the end the 50th was obliged to fall back toward the river.

Washington Advised Something May Happen in the Tampico Fields Today.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—New reports of a German plot to destroy the Tampico oil wells, from which the American and British navies draw a large part of their oil supply, reached the state department today. They said an attempt to destroy the wells was to be made tomorrow.

Many reports of a similar nature have reached Washington. Officials here are depending on the Mexican authorities to protect the wells, as a large part of the Mexican Government's revenues are derived from oil taxes.
