COL. CULVER IN CORK

Former U. S. Consul Here Gets Warm
Reception in That City.

The "Constitution," of Cork, Ire-
land, contains the following reference
to Col. Culver, who was until lately
United States Consul in this city, and
who was transferred by his govern-
ment to Cork, when the office in Lon-
don was abolished:

"Yesterday the Right Hon. the Lord
Mayor received an official visit from the
newly-appointed United States Consul
at this port, Mr. Henry S. Culver, who
was introduced by his predecessor, Mr.
Edwin Norton Gunsaulus. The Lord
Mayor hospitably received his visitors
in his room at the municipal buildings,
and was accompanied by the town
clerk (Mr. F. W. McCarthy), and the
secretary (Mr. D. P. Giltinan). The
city flag was hoisted in honor of the
occasion. Mr. Gunsaulus, who has
gained many friends during his com-
paratively brief stay at Queenstown, is
leaving, at his own desire, to occupy a
similar position at a port with which
his family are connected, and carries
with him the best wishes of all with
whom his duties brought him into
contact. Mr. Culver comes from Lon-
don, in Canada, where he also filled the
position of United States Consul. He
expressed in warm terms his admira-
tion of the city and harbor, and looks
forward to a pleasant sojourn among
the people of the city. The Lord Mayor
cordially welcomed him on the part of the citizens, and as-
sured him of their desire to make his
stay as agreeable as that of any of
his predecessors."

A Delightful Winter Resort
It is announced that this year the
Canadian Pacific Railway Company's
fine hotel at Caledonia Springs, Ont.,
will be kept open for the accommoda-
tion of visitors all winter. The com-
pany has great faith in Caledonia

BENNETT'S OPENED
FOR THE SEASON

Magnificent New Playhouse
Filled to Capacity.

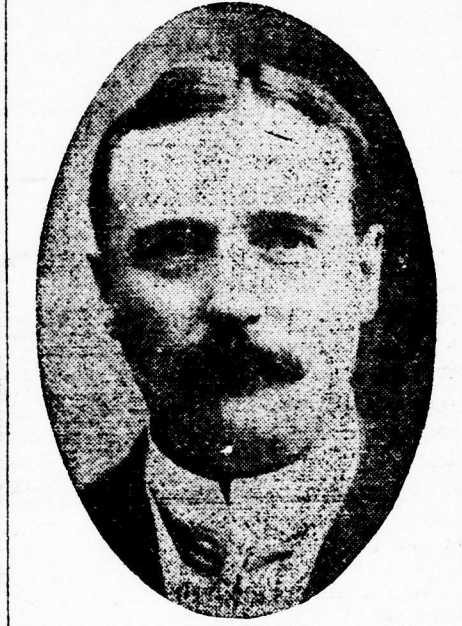
VAUDEVILLE BILL IS A FINE ONE

Star Acts Please Londoners and Win
Applause — Mr. Bennett
Entertains.

With the swing and dash of the ad-
vanced Bennett ideas, the new vaude-
ville theater in this city was opened
last night. The house was packed from
pit to gallery, and the audience was
treated to one of the finest bills ever
seen in London.

The handsome theater, finished in
white and gold, was resplendent with
myriads of electric bulbs. The furnish-
ings were of the richest, and the uni-
forms of the attaches added a metro-
politan air to the playhouse. The audi-
ence was composed of the most dis-
criminating of local theatergoers, and
all lavished applause on the different
acts.

Honor Is Due.
Considering that it was the first time
the stage fittings had been used, the
vaudeville worked along with com-

mendable smoothness, and the stage
crew deserves credit for the manner
in which the acts were handled.

Manager Driscoll's plans for the
opening night show that he is wide
awake and astute, and the comfort of
his patrons is his first consideration. It
is a foregone conclusion that he will
be a very popular manager before
many moons.

The feature act of this week's bill is
the sketch of Miss May Duryea and
Mr. Charles Deland. It is a neat little
playlet entitled "The Imposter," in
which the two artists find scope for no
ordinary amount of histrionic ability,
and in which are to be found some
clever situations and sparkling dia-
logue. The ambition of a young lady
to become a trained nurse causes her
to become a bet in the club that she
will make her tired of the work, and
he feigns illness and becomes her
first patient. She deceives him at his
own game, however, and by acting a
part, turns the tables on him. The
superb Bennett settings were seen to
good effect in this act, as they were
also throughout the evening.

A Real Funny Man.
Al Lawrence, that prince of fun-
makers, was heard for the first time in
London. He is a gentlemanly talker
with a brand new monologue, bristling

with legitimate jokes that proved side-
splitters with the audience, except oc-
casional when it took some time to
consider them. They were handed out
with maxims gun rapidly, and when a
joke was lost on the crowd Lawrence
would jolly his hearers.

"I'm four jokes ahead of you now,"
he remarked once, when an exception-
ally good one got by.
Webb and Connolly made good with
a very fine musical playlet, in which
Miss Webb won hearty applause.
Doherty's poolies proved a most ac-
ceptable act, the fuzzy little canines
going through innumerable tricks.
As a ventriloquist, Whittle is all the
way.
The Columbians have a splendid mus-
ical fantasy, entitled, "A Bit of China,"
in which a human doll makes a tre-
mendous hit, and Demoria and Bell are

as good as the best in a very pleasing
musical skit.

Prof. Stevens' splendid orchestra ren-
dered a specially prepared programme
for the occasion. It was an "Old Folks"
Medley Overture, and it was rendered
in dashing style.

Guests Entertained.
At the conclusion of the performance
the directors of Bennett's Theatrical
Enterprises, the four house managers,
and a number of others, were enter-
tained at a dinner given in the Teum-
seh House. The affair was most pre-
tentious, and proved very enjoyable.

The Popular Bennett.
A lengthy toast list was carried out,
the keynote of the speeches being good-
will towards General Manager Bennett
and best wishes for his success in his
new and important ventures.

Some very nice things were said of
the affable gentleman who came to
London two years ago, an unknown
quantity, and who in that time turned
a losing house into one of the best-
paying theatrical propositions in Can-
ada, and who also succeeded in asso-
ciating himself with some of London's
most solid and respected citizens in the
establishing of a chain of theaters
which it is predicted will yet extend its
links from Halifax to Vancouver.

Mr. Bennett accepted in a modest
manner the compliments showered up-
on him, thanking all for their kind
words, and especially thanking the pub-
lic for their appreciation of his efforts
to furnish them with clean, whole-
some amusement.

The party broke up at an early hour
after the toastmaster, Mr. Pringle, had
been duly honored.
A feature of the dinner was a very
clever skit composed by Al Lawrence,
the monologist, and which contained
hits on many of the guests. Some of
the jokes were pointed enough, but all
were keen in good part.
Mr. Hooker, manager of the Colum-
bia Phonograph Company's local
branch, also favored with some of the
latest records, and Prof. Stevens won
applause for several piano solos ren-
dered in his own brilliant manner.

LECTURE ON MISSION WORK

Rural Dean Dixon Tells of What Is
Being Done in Nova Scotia.

Rev. Rural Dean Dixon, of Wolf-
ville, N. S., addressed the students at
Huron College last evening on mis-
sionary work in the Maritime Provinces.
Principal Waller introduced the speak-
er, who, after sketching the history of
the Church of England in Nova Scotia,
described some of the old churches of
Nova Scotia, many of which were built
of timbers brought from Boston in
1749. Among the churches mentioned
was the notable St. Paul's of Halifax.
Rural Dean Dixon also gave a splendid
description of the parochial system,
which is modeled on that of New En-
gland, and which is more democratic
than that of Western Canada, in that
the people elect the clergymen and both
wardens. The first services were held
in Annapolis Royal on its capture by
Governor Nicholson of Massachusetts
in 1710.

At the conclusion of the lecture Rural
Dean Dixon gave a brief history of
King's College at Windsor, which was
founded in the year 1787 by royal char-
ter, and is the oldest colonial university
in the British Empire.
Mr. Dixon entered Huron College in
the year 1877, and as one of the first
students of the institution wished it
every success. He said he hoped that
in a few years the Western University
would be placed upon a firm and per-
manent basis.

"THE MEN WHO WIN"

Lecture by Rev. D. E. Martin at Wesley
Hall.

Rev. D. E. Martin delivered an inter-
esting lecture, entitled "The Men Who
Win," in Wesley Hall, last evening,
before a large audience. Among other
things upon which Mr. Martin placed
special emphasis was the necessity of
spiritual life in a successful career. He
drew some interesting pictures of men
who had made great names for them-
selves and left behind them unperish-
able records in the annals of time. An-
other essential to which Mr. Martin
referred was courage, which, he said,
in the lives of truly great men, was
never wanting—courage to stand fast
against all obstacles and temptations
which beset them in life, and courage
to be true to their convictions, no
matter what others say. He referred
to patriotism as another great essen-
tial. A man must be enthusiastic about
the resources and possibilities of this
great country, which is astonishing the
world by its progress. "The men who
are to win," said Mr. Martin, "must be
patriotic, enthusiastic and courageous."

FAMOUS BAND TOOK
AUDIENCE BY STORM

**Besses o' th' Barn a Revela-
tion—Artistic Treat at
the Grand.**

The Besses o' th' Barn Band, that
famous old English organization,
known the world over as the finest
brass band in existence, attracted a
fair-sized and highly appreciative audi-
ence to the Grand last night. The
music-loving element of London was
well represented, and to say that the
band pleased is to put it mildly, indeed.
The applause was incessant, and Band-
master Alexander Owen, though he may
have been a little disappointed at the
size of the audience, could not but be
pleased with the result of the recep-
tion. A fatted him. In the house were
many Englishmen, who well remem-
bered the little bandmaster across the
big pond, and he was greeted with a
shower of "Hello Alox!" the moment he
put his foot on the stage. Though they
listened with breathless appreciation
while the different numbers were being
rendered, during the intermission even
the balcony kept up a constant flow of
very audible eulogistic remarks, and
words of encouragement.

The band came direct to London from
Jamestown, N. Y., where on Sunday
night it played to 5,000 people. In Chi-
cago at the White City it played to 40-
600 people recently. From London it
goes to Hamilton for one night, then
to Massey Hall, Toronto, for the bal-
ance of the week, and on Sunday it will
be at the Hippodrome, New York, for
an extended engagement.

Besses o' th' Barn Band is remarkable
in that it does not contain a single reed
instrument, all being of brass. And
the quality of the music was such as to
inspire all who heard the musicians to
the very heights of appreciation.

A feature of the programme was the
trombone solo, "The Death of Nelson,"
rendered by Mr. T. Bowring, assisted
by the band. From the sobbing dirge
of the sad lament, the music rose to
the heights of magnificence, and as in
the thunderous melody the audience
heard the words, "England this day ex-
pects that every man will do his duty,"
the applause for several minutes was
defining.

A selection from Sullivan's "The Pi-
rates of Penzance" found great favor
with the audience, as did also Rossini's
"Italiana."

A cornet solo rendered by Mr. T. G.
Moore was one of the most artistic
musical treats it has ever been the
privilege of Londoners to hear. He
chose for his number the "Maiden
Song," arranged by Owen, and he was
given a couple of recalls for his ef-
fort.

The sweetness, softness and depth of
tone of the brass instruments surprised
the audience, and it was freely remark-
ed that it was no wonder France went
wild over that band. Those who failed
to hear the organization can rely
on it that they missed an artistic mus-
ical treat.
