LIFEBOAT FIRED UPON

LONDON, March 15.—Only thirteen men of the crew of the Norwegian steamer Storstad, a Belgian relief ship, have been landed, says a Cork dispatch to Lloyd's War News. They were the occupants of the only boat to reach shore, which they did after fighting stormy seas for 36 hours. The other engineer died of exposure, and two boats containing more than thirty men, are missing.

Captain Anderson of the Storstad, the dispatch adds, said that the Germans could see the Belgian relief sign on the sea.
