DR. W. J. HOLMES

DIES AT GODERICH

GODERICH. Oct. 15.—Dr. W. J. R. Holmes, for 34 years treasurer of the county of Huron, is dead at his home, after an illness of two months. He was one of the best-known men in the county. His father, the late John Holmes, was at one time a member of the Legislature of Upper Canada for the Huron tract. comprising the counties of Huron, Perth and Bruce, and the village of Holmesville, where the doctor was born, was named after the family. He attended the Goderich Grammar School under the late John Haldane, the first principal of the school, and afterwards graduated from Upper Canada College and the Toronto Wedical College.

Shortly after completing his studies he accepted a commission in the Northern army, with which he served until he end of the American civil war, when he returned to Canada and began the mactice of medicine at Bluevale, and afterwards at what is now the village of Rrussels in this county. In 1887 he was married to Janet Burns of Oshawa, who predeceased him some three-years ago. Three sons survive—Dudley, hardstern of Wincham: Hilton, of Fort William, and Fred Barlow of Toronto, The late Dr. Holmes was a Conservative, and on two occasions contested the Huron ridings in the interests of his party.
