Parry Sound, May 6.-Today the grand council of the Ojibway tribe, representing 15,000 Indians in Ontario, is meeting in the council hall on Parry Sound. Another request the grand council is making is to have Parry Island and other reserves surveyed and divided into farms. The Parry Island reserve contains 15,000 acres.

More Than 5,000 Persons Are Placed Under Arrest by Government Troops.

Berlin, May 6.—One hundred and fifty persons were killed or executed Today-Fresh during the fighting at Munich, according to an account of the fall of that showery. ing to an account of the fall of that city printed in the Lokal Anzeiger. Among the killed were Herr Toller, director of the soviet government, and Herr Sontheimer, a communist leader. Herr Seidl, who was said to have insteaded the shooting of hostages, was beaten to death by Wuerttemburg soldiers, it is said.

The Tageblatt states that five thousand arrests have been made in Munich, the prisoners including Dr. Levien, leader of the Bavarian Independent Socialists and Town Governor Weber.
