SAMARITAN CLUB DOES GOOD WORK

Reports Submitted at Fifth Annual Meeting Prove Very Satisfactory.

The fifth annual meeting of the Samaritan Club took place yesterday afternoon in the Gage Building, Mrs. C. H. Wilson presiding. In her address Mrs. Wilson referred to the general success of the year, to the very fine work of the visiting nurse, Miss Stewart, to the co-operation of the members of the club, and to the fact that no call had been left unanswered. In addition to the usual work of helping with food and clothing in the homes where tuberculosis is known to have a footing, the members of the club had undertaken to look after the families of tubercular soldiers. They hoped to extend this portion of their work.

RUSSIAN CHOIR GIVES RARE MUSICAL TREAT

Singers From Cathedral of St. Nicholas, New York, Renders Program of Church Music.

The concert given last evening by the Russian choir of the Cathedral of St. Nicholas, New York, in Convocation Hall, proved to be one of the most interesting of its kind that it has been the good fortune of Toronto admirers of church music to hear. As was explained by President Falconer in opening the concert, the choir of 24 boys and eight men came here thru the courtesy of the Russian archbishop of North America and the generosity of Chas. R. Crane, United States ex-ambassador to Russia. They were to be welcomed, he said, not only on account of the interest attaching to their work, but also as representing a great ally, the value of whose contribution to the present world struggle would best be understood by future historians.

M'MASTER HALL AWARDS DEGREES

N. W. Rowell Delivers Stirring Speech at Annual Commencement.

Citing the action of the United States in entering the war against Germany, the overthrow of the Russian monarchy, the official recognition of labor by Great Britain and the enfranchisement of women in Canada as representing great strides in the progress of democracy during war time, N. W. Rowell in delivering the commencement address at the annual exercises of McMaster University in Castle Memorial Hall, Brock street, last night before approximately 50 persons, expressed the hope that democracy would soon remove the Hohenzollern family from autocratic domination of the Teutonic empire and Austria-Hungary.

SEVEN HUNDRED MEN ATTESTED IN APRIL

Rumor Circulated That Militia Regiments May Be Called Out for Home Defence.

During the month of April, 218 recruits came up for examination at the Toronto mobilization centre, 717 of them being accepted and fully attested. The other 478 were rejected, 169 had their papers held and 308 are entered as "on file." The latter class were found to be fit for active service, but that as a matter of fact they had no intention of "signing up," and on finding they were medically fit declined to be attested.

SOCIALISTS PROTEST AGAINST CIVIC ACTION

Say Disfranchisement of Naturalized Citizens is Contrary to Liberty of British Constitution.

At the annual May Day celebrations of the Social-Democratic Party of Canada at the Labor Temple last evening a strongly worded resolution was enthusiastically adopted condemning the action of the city council in its attempt to deprive the foreign population of its rights to use the franchise and calling upon the federal government to ignore such a request as being "contrary to the boasted liberality of the British constitution, which concedes to every naturalized citizen the right of a British born subject." The resolution was moved by James Simpson and seconded by J. McArthur Conner.

The report of the secretary, Miss Blackwell, told of the various methods by which funds had been raised. The Treasurer's report showed the total receipts for the year to have been \$960.44, and expenditures \$604.88. A rest home at Cheltenham has been recently purchased, and many donations given towards it, but the members were warned that there is yet much to be done before it is altogether free from debt and equipped. Dr. (Capt.) Geo. D. Porter gave an address on the prevention of tuberculosis, and musical numbers were given by Mrs. John A. Walker and Miss Made Murphy. Miss Julia Stewart told of the work in connection with visiting the homes, and pointed out that the there are said to be 500 tubercular soldiers in Canada, only six were given them as being in this district, tho the club had expressed its willingness to take over this section of service.

The choir was robed in the black, red and gold vestments of the Russian church, and was under the leadership of Ivan T. Gorolchik, whose splendid control was remarkably evidenced in every number. The music performed was purely liturgical, and the work of living Russian composers, and both in form and delivery it was profoundly reverential in feeling. The choir's singing was unaccompanied, and marked by rare tonal quality in all voices, the sustained, bell-like tones of the soprano and alto boys being particularly fine. A feature of unusual interest was the magnificent shading in the quieter passages, and the surprising volume of tone that could be produced by the 32 singers. A large audience accorded the visitors a warm welcome and enthusiastic appreciation of their various numbers.

Chancellor McCorminn conferred the degree of Bachelor of Arts upon Harriet S. Ellis, of Toronto, and Max of Aris upon Walter G. Gingery, of Toronto. Thirty-one students received their B. A. degree in course, three received the M. A. degree in course and two received the B. Th. degree in course, while four were recognized as having completed the three years' English course.

Major Claude S. Pote, commander of the 19th Regiment Service Battalion, has received promotion to rank of lieutenant-colonel. He was one of the first officers to go to the front, and served with great distinction, being awarded the Military Cross for gallant conduct. He served in several big battles and was badly wounded. At the moment of his promotion he was in command of the 19th Battalion, and was in the front line of the battle of Arras.

A remarkable reception was accorded Isaac Bainbridge, secretary of the Social Democratic Party of Canada, and editor of "Forward," who appeared before Justice Latchford on a charge of "sedition." He stated that the case would make no difference to his attitude in standing for the solidity of the working classes. He commented upon the admission of Justice Latchford in his summing up when he said he recognized that five years hence, under the changing conditions a case like his (Bainbridge's) would not be brought before the court for sedition. He told them that in the British West Indies, on the revelation of C. Bowman, M.P., and chairman of the Trade Union Congress of Great Britain, that the legislature of the British West Indies, with the sanction of Hon. Walter Long of the British cabinet, had delayed trade unionism in the British West Indies. Following his speech the meeting adjourned.

AMERICAN OFFICER JOINS C.E.F.

Records show a marked advance in recruiting for the 71st Battery, C. E. F., four men being attested on Monday and five yesterday. Among the recent recruits is a staff captain from the New York Artillery, U. S. A., who joined the 71st and left for England with a draft a few days after landing.

Separate School Board Discusses Medical Inspection Questions

At the regular meeting of the separate school board, last evening, presided over by Rev. Dean J. L. Hand, the question of medical inspection of the school was under discussion. D. Carey maintained that the separate school board has a proper right to have medical inspection, and stated that the members of the board should give it every consideration. The chairman, in reply, said the separate school board had never opposed medical inspection, and it was decided to give the city every assistance. It was pointed out that the necessary equipment will have to be provided, and a resolution was adopted that the management committee be authorized to purchase all the equipment that may be necessary.

RECORD OF Q. O. R. CADETS.

One hundred and eighty-seven of the Q. O. R. Cadet Corps are now on active service with the C. E. F. Major W. F. Kirk of the training school has undertaken to build up the cadet unit again. So many left for overseas service that the unit had become depleted. It will be resumed by the corps last night.

FAIL TO TRACE PARENTS.

Despite investigation by the police no trace of the parents of the child found on a doorstep at 119 Havelock Street, Monday night has been found. The babe is two weeks old, and was warmly wrapped when found by the occupants of the house. The child was removed to the Infants' Home.

HAD FINGER AMPUTATED.

As the result of being caught in some machinery while following his employment yesterday afternoon, Walter Scott, 205 Van Horne street, had one of his fingers amputated at the Western Hospital.

CHILD BADLY SCALDED

Two-year-old Helen Cook, 239 Ontario street, was badly scalded about the head and shoulders yesterday afternoon, when she accidentally pulled a kettle of hot water over in her home. She was removed to the Hospital for Sick Children, where her condition is regarded as serious.
