

TERAULAY EXTENSION ENDORSED BY BOARD

Local Improvement Works Totaling Over Three Millions Sent on to Council.

INCREASED FARES ON FERRY

The whole local improvement program as sent forward by the committee on works was passed by the board of control yesterday. This will add \$3,700,000 to the \$7,200,000 already passed in the estimates.

Mayor Church argued that some of it ought to be held up on account of the high interest rate, and Controller Maguire favored limiting the Teraulay street extension work this year to the opening of a street from College to Grenville. The rest of the proposition could be carried over.

The mayor said he would like to see a car line on the Teraulay extension, even connected up with the proposed Mount Pleasant civic line.

This improvement was needed, said Controller Ramsden to handle the northbound traffic. The eight members of the works committee had voted for it, he told the board. "Let the proposition come up in council," said Controller Maguire finally.

Boast of Ferry Fares.
The application of the Toronto Ferry Company for the right to increase fares to the island to 16 cents return was endorsed by the board, after consideration of Commissioner Bradshaw's report that at the old tariff the company would lose \$8000 on this year's operations.

Controller Ramsden said the increase was granted he would not operate the boats except on days when ball games were held at the island.

Mayor Church admitted that the company could not be compelled to give a service. Controller Ramsden moved that the board approve an increase to four trips for a quarter, but the other members of the board thought the increase asked for was justified.

Appeal of Soldiers.
An appeal was made to the board of control yesterday to grant exemption from taxation for a soldier's club.

**BIG CHANGES IN
HOTEL DEPARTMENT**
Canadian National Makes Appointments and Promotions From May 1.

Several important changes in the organization of the sleeping, dining and hotel department of Canadian National Railways are to go into effect on May 1, according to official announcements made by Walter Pratt, Jr., manager of the Department, at the head office of the C. N. R. here today.

J. M. Grieve, who was Superintendent of the Department at Winnipeg, was promoted to be General Superintendent with jurisdiction over sleeping, dining and parlor cars and of the news headquarters will be at Toronto.

H. B. Wollen succeeds Mr. Grieve as Assistant Superintendent. The headquarters of both Mr. Wollen and Mr. Worry will be at Winnipeg.

In addition to these appointments Mr. H. J. Lambkin is appointed District Commissioner Agent, succeeding Mr. Worry. His headquarters will also be at Winnipeg.

CITY HALL NOTES

Judgment handed down by the Ontario Railway Board saves the city \$28,000 on the cost of widening the Toronto-Hamilton Highway from 18 to 24 feet. The apportionment of the cost between the city limits and O'Connor's road, a distance of two miles, was in dispute.

Manager Cousins of the harbor commission now in England, who was asked by cable by Mayor Church, to get quotations from English firms on that owing to transportation difficulties he cannot obtain quotations at present. He suggests that if an order can be placed for a number of cars, a company would be formed to build the cars in Toronto.

FRUIT STORES MAY KEEP OPEN LATE

Legislative Committee Exempts Them From Early Closing Bylaw.

The municipal committee of the legislature yesterday heard a deputation from the Retail Merchants' Association, when J. W. Curry's bill, depriving municipalities of the right to pass early closing bylaws, except where the exemption was provided for by the electorate, was considered.

By 23 yeas to 10 the committee decided that all bylaws passed under sub-section of the factory, shop and office buildings act shall cease to be effective on and after April 30, 1920, in so far as they apply to the sale of fruit. This was a redraft which J. W. Curry made on his bill, and aroused particular interest in that it affected the early closing bylaw passed by the city of Toronto. A vigorous protest against the bill was made by W. S. Manning, Doherty, minister of agriculture, who supported the bill.

Labor Versus U.F.O.
It was also interesting to note the clash between Laborites and members of the U.F.O. Hon. Mr. Rolfe, minister of labor, stated bluntly that if labor went through its original form the Farmers would warrant everything that came out of them in connection with class legislation.

Hon. Manning Doherty, minister of agriculture, strongly supported the measure, on the grounds that it would not operate to the disadvantage of Labor interests, as it would be found that stores which remain open after hours usually employ members of their families.

Wilson Crockett, South Wentworth, declared it operated against the workmen's struggle to restrict hours of labor. He further contended that it did not militate against the fruit growers' interests. He was vociferously interrupted by the deputation of fruit growers, who shouted: "You're wrong. That's not right."

R. Reece Hall, Parry Sound, supported the measure and opposed Mr. Crockett's views, particularly on the grounds that the people's willingness to work with extra hours should not be interfered with.

Fruit Growers Petition.
A sheaf of resolutions were presented to the committee by Mr. McLaughlin, counsel for the fruit growers, asking that no early closing legislation be enacted, and that all existing bylaws be rescinded. Mr. McLaughlin argued that the necessity of furnishing fresh fruit to the consumer demanded that the storekeepers be permitted to remain open in the evening.

Hon. Mr. Crawford's motion, seconded by Dr. Stevenson, Labor member for London, to delay the bill for one year was overwhelmingly defeated, only getting seven votes.

Mr. Curry suggested a redraft, that bylaws passed under the subsection shall cease to be effective on and after April 30, in so far as they apply to the sale of fruit.

H. H. Dewar considered the bill an unfair interference with the rights of a municipality to regulate its own business.

Mr. Curry's redraft carried by 24 votes to 5.

NO LEGISLATION YET FOR MUNICIPAL PHONES

Mayor Church has received no encouragement from Sir Adam Beck for his proposal for a municipal telephone system using on line of poles for hydro radiating lights, power and telephones. He read a letter to the board of control yesterday from Sir Adam Beck, in which the latter stated that the necessary legislation for the government for the necessary legislation had not met with no response up to the present. Without this nothing could be done.

Some steps in this direction, the mayor thought, were necessary to curb the Bell Company's move towards higher rates. This company was increasing its capital from \$200,000 to \$750,000, and the public might expect heavier rates to meet increased dividends.

HALF DIVORCES GRANTED ON TRUMPED-UP CHARGES

Washington, April 23.—More than 50 per cent. of the divorces granted in the United States are based on "trumped-up charges" resulting from the fascination of the husband or wife for someone else, Francis Minor Moody, of Chicago, executive secretary of the International committee on marriage and divorce, declared today before the senate judiciary committee.

Appearing in support of a joint resolution proposing a constitutional amendment providing for uniform federal marriage and divorce laws, Mr. Moody declared that the divorce evil was a "worse plague than the season ever was," and that the remedy was in federal legislation.

BACK FROM CONVENTION.

Miss Jean Gunn, superintendent of the Toronto General Hospital, and Miss Kathleen Russell, of the Toronto public health department, have returned from Atlanta, Georgia, where they attended the biennial meeting of the three great American national nursing organizations. Miss Eunice Dyke, who also attended the convention, has not yet returned. As president of the Canadian Nurses' Association of Trained Nurses, Miss Gunn, while in the south, also attended a meeting of the executive of the International Council of Nurses.

EXTEND RAILWAY IN NEW ONTARIO

Government Measure is Introduced Into the Legislature.

HONOR THEIR LEADER

Howard Ferguson Given Presentation on Eve of Holiday Trip.

Routine business occupied the attention of the legislature yesterday. Extension of the Timiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway is shortly to be undertaken. A bill to provide for the extension was introduced by Premier Drury. He explained that the government did not bind itself to proceed at once with the work.

Municipalities will be given power to grant exemption of from 10 to 25 per cent. on property improvements under another measure introduced by the prime minister.

Mr. Drury explained that the bill was designed to apply particularly to certain municipalities in Northern Ontario, where land was much in need of improvement. Municipalities must submit a bylaw to be ratified by the electors before proceeding with the exemption scheme. The exemption may be increased not more than 25 per cent. every year, until the total value of the improvements has been reached.

Paternal Legislation.
A second reading was given J. W. Curry's bill respecting the hearing of apartment houses. In the course of the debate H. H. Dewar thought some action should be taken against those landlords who refused to rent to people with children. The premier said he, too, had heard of people with families being discriminated against and thought something should be done.

The bill, Hon. Howard Ferguson said, was too paternal.

The Temperance Debate.
The premier hoped that the temperance debate would be resumed on Monday instead of Tuesday, as to expedite the business of the house. He asked for the co-operation of the members in rushing business through.

Hon. H. Ferguson honored Mr. Ferguson with the house. Mr. Ferguson was presented with a gold mounted walking stick by the Conservative members of the house.

**L.W.W. MINER'S ORGAN
IS BARRED IN CANADA**

Butte, Mont., April 23.—The Butte Daily Bulletin, reputed organ of the L. W. W. miners' organization, and which took a leading part in last week's strike here, has been banned in Canada. Postmaster Goodwin made the announcement today adding that he was acting under instructions from Washington.

Federal soldiers began patrolling Butte streets today. A demonstration marked the arrival of the troops last night. Operations of several big mines in the district at once made plans to resume operations.

Governor Stewart asked for the soldiers after a riot near the Never sweat mine, in which 14 men were shot and a policeman injured. Yesterday a guard placed at the office of The Daily Bulletin was shot.

Handbills circulated by the L. W. W. say the strike is still in effect. "Don't walk to the mines over the blood of your fellow-workers," say the posters.

The building at 259 Yonge street, formerly occupied by the Newcombe Piano Company, has been leased by Bulmer's, Sellers-Gough Company, to Bulmer's, Limited, for three years. A restaurant will be opened on the main floor, and the third floor will be used for executive offices.

JEWISH RELIEF PASSES OBJECTIVE

\$200,000 Raised by Persistent Efforts of Devoted Workers.

Having passed their objective of about \$200,000, the Canadian Jewish war relief committee yesterday declared the campaign closed. For four days and a half an army of 400 workers has been canvassing the city with persistent energy to raise \$200,000 for the relief of starving children in some parts of eastern and central Europe. The campaigners glory most, not in the fact that they have passed their objective, nor in the success of their tireless efforts, but in the knowledge that as a result of their labors, thousands of empty little stomachs are being filled and thousands of naked little bodies are being clothed.

At the final luncheon yesterday, the vassing among the banks and the figures showed that our financial institutions are not managed wholly by commercial tyrants, but by human beings with charitable instincts and warm hearts. Among the most notable subscriptions received yesterday was a cheque for \$100 from the members of the office staff. This is a splendid example of practised respect, as the clerks and stenographers did fully their share towards the cause by their diligent and conscientious work every day of the campaign. Toronto, having performed its duty in this matter, watches with interest the endeavors of the other centres, quite confident that the Dominion campaign will not fall short of its million-dollar objective.

BOARD ENDORSES DAYLIGHT SAVING

Vote Will Be Called for Next January on the Principle.

"Daylight saving" was approved by the board of control yesterday, and with the consent of the council, the city clerk will be instructed to publish a proclamation, making the change effective between May 2 and September 25. The board also called for a vote of the people next January on the daylight saving idea.

Controller Maguire moved an amendment that the clocks be put back one hour only thru July, August, and September, but he got no support. Only Controller Gibbons opposed the principle of daylight saving. He said the majority of the women and children were against it, and a great body of the workingmen.

U. S. ADMIRAL SUICIDES.

Washington, April 23.—Rear-Admiral Carlo B. C. Brittain, chief of staff for Admiral Henry B. Wilson, commander of the Atlantic fleet, committed suicide by shooting himself yesterday while on duty with the fleet in Cuban waters.
