show that the average earnings of the mine workers were approximately fifteen hundred dollars per year, and represented a living wage.

The operators also attacked the accuracy of the miners' figures, which purport to show that the average wage of the day men in the anthracite fields is but \$900 per year and the contract men from \$1,200 to \$1,400. The mine owners presented data showing that the wage advances received by the workers since 1914 average approximately 70 per cent.
