JOE GANS WINS IN ELEVENTH

Boer Unholz Proves To Be
No Match for Black
Whirlwind.

San Francisco, May 14.—Joe Gans beat Rudolph Unholz, the Boer fighter, in the eleventh round of their bout tonight for the world's lightweight championship.

At the end of the first round Gans had a slight lead, having partially closed the Boer's left eye with a right hook.

In the second round Unholz had slightly the better of it. His right caught Gans on the jaw as the latter was coming in.

The third round was a bit in favor of Unholz, who landed some good punches.

The fourth round was Gans'. He floored Unholz with a left upper cut, and the Boer was down for the count of five.

SOCCER SERIES OPEN TOMORROW

The London W. F. A. Team
