

WEST MONTROSE.

A village in the township of Woolwich, twelve miles from Berlin, and eight from Breslau station. The village is situated on the Grand River, which affords good hydraulic privileges. It contains a cloth factory, and a saw-mill, and a common school, averaging sixty pupils. Mr. Gerrie, teacher. There is one church—United Brethern—Rev. D. B. Shirk, pastor. The village was first settled in 1851 by J. Benner and A. Smith, and the post office was established in 1860, J. B. Kilborne, first and present P. M.
