PROF. ROBT. M. RAYMOND

Professor Raymond has had an interesting career, his special work taking him to many parts of North and South America, to Australia, China, and South Africa, where he was when the Boer war broke out, and finally to Mexico, where war again interrupted his operations.

He was a member of the Mining and Exploring Company of London until the Mexican war made their operations there impossible. William Raymond, son of W. E. Raymond, was with him for a time, until he joined an overseas engineering unit. From St. John Mr. and Mrs. Raymond went to Bloomfield to visit Mr. Raymond's brothers, who reside there.

FATHER BELLEVUE GOES TO MONCTON EARLY IN OCTOBER

Rev. Hector L. Bellevue, who has been stationed at the Cathedral since his ordination two years ago, has been appointed by His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc to be assistant to Rev. Henry Cormier, Moncton, and will begin his new duties on the first Sunday of October. He succeeds Rev. Emile Ouellet, who has been made parish priest at Slemogue.

Father Bellevue will be much missed from the Cathedral staff. He is an excellent preacher and earnest worker and has won many friends here. It is just two years since his ordination after graduation from St. Joseph's in 1910 and the Grand Seminary of Quebec, in 1914.

MRS. McAVITY'S PICTURES ATTRACT ATTENTION

In the fine collection of pictures in the art department at the Exhibition, are four or five by a Nova Scotia lady, whose artistic gift has won recognition from very discriminating and critical authorities—Mrs. McAvity of Bridgetown. All the sketches show a subtle individual touch—the touch which is Mrs. McAvity's own and they have been viewed with special interest both because of their artistic merit and as being the work of a Nova Scotia woman. One of the most appealing is from the group from the point of view of the majority of the visitors to the art building is entitled "An Acadian Madonna." There are three others, one a portrait of John Irving, K.C.; one a portrait of the artist's mother, and one sketch entitled "The Victoria Cross." Mrs. McAvity is one of the gifted little group of Nova Scotians whose artistic gift goes hand in hand with a genuine interest in and love of art—growing which, growing steadily, thanks to the educative influence of our art school—that school which, in the face of so much discouragement, has gone on its way, backed most faithfully by a few choice and discerning spirits.

PAROCHIAL SCHOOLS AS SOCIAL CENTERS

Washington, Sept. 22.—Parochial schools should be used more generally as social centres for both children and adults, according to views expressed by speakers at the final sessions of the National Conference of Catholic Charities here. Parish halls, likewise, might be turned into meeting places for the benefit of the community.

Other discussions turned about the advisability of employing public nurses to visit homes where there is no sickness, to give advice which would prevent outbreaks of disease. Instruction in sanitation and practical health subjects for the poor and uneducated were urged as the duty of social workers.
