## URGENT LONGSHOREMEN TO SEE TO "SAFETY FIRST"

The inquest held by Coroner Kenney in regard to the death of Arthur J. Bodington, longshoreman, who was killed while at work on the Donaldson liner *Marina*, was concluded last night. The verdict was, in effect, that Bodington was killed by being struck by a sling of sugar and being knocked into No. 2 hold of the steamer *Marina*; that the sling was caused to swing past the usual landing place by the winch not being reversed and by the boom being guyed too far over towards the hatch.

The jury recommended that the principle "Safety First" be adopted by the longshoremen as the danger, in this case, was evident to everybody and nothing was done to obviate it.

The jury was of the opinion that it was extremely dangerous to work two gangs on one gangway.

## RECORD YEAR AT THIS PORT

In a news letter which is being sent out by the board of trade, attention is called, among other matters, to the big increase in export business from this port during the last year, as follows: "The value of exports at the port of St. John for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1915, is officially given as \$48,973,982, which is \$18,978,211 in excess of the year 1914, the banner year of the port. The imports were valued

at \$9,112,916, as against \$9,287,875 in 1914, and \$9,878,006 in 1913. With the exception of these two years the import values for the year just ended were larger than for any other year in the history of St. John. One evidence of the satisfactory conditions at the port of St. John is shown by the fact that, for the week ending April 24, the sum of approximately \$40,000 was paid out in the loading and discharging of ocean steamers and in the loading and discharging of car freight."

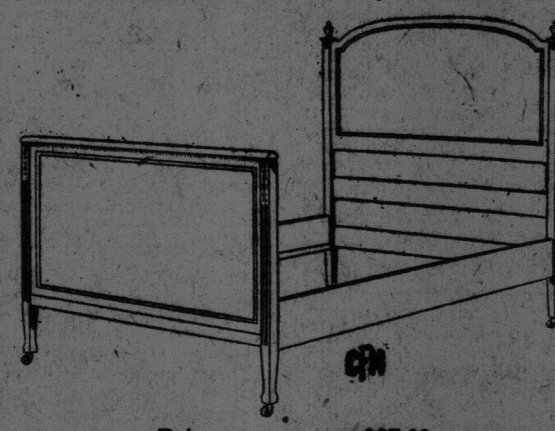

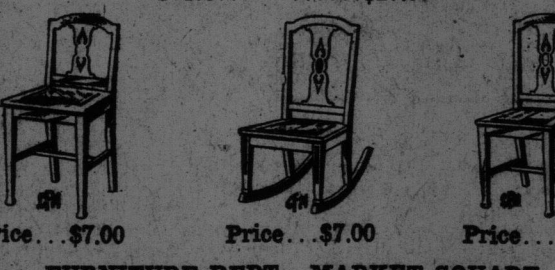
