TALKS ON CREDIT TO RETAILERS

J. F. Edgett of Moncton Advocates Mutual Information Bureau

MONCTON, Feb. 11.—At the annual meeting of the Retail Merchants' Association, held here tonight, the following officers were elected: President, A. Sversten; first vice-president, P. D. Ayer; executive, J. A. Fog, D. McBeth, Joseph White, F. W. S. Colpitts, N. S. Steves, A. L. Colpitts, J. W. Morris; audit committee, J. S. Ross, A. F. Doyle and Cecil Fiske; R. M. J. Fred Edgett addressed the meeting on the subject of credit.

WM. EDGETT'S ADDRESS

During the course of his address he said there was a Dominion movement to assist the retailer in the matter of over-extending credit. The retailer was suffering from the handicap of not having the same amount of information as was available to the wholesaler and the manufacturer relative to their customers.

One of the greatest troubles to the retailer trade was what he called the "Dead Beat," the man who tried every merchant in turn until his credit was exhausted in every place and finally reached the end of his tether.

To overcome many of the difficulties of the retailer here, Mr. Edgett advocated the organization of a bureau of mutual information, and said he saw no reason why such a system could not be worked in Moncton and St. John with the retailer as well as with the wholesaler as was now the case.

C. C. Hayward, president of the provincial association, gave an instructive talk on the subject of collections. D. A. McBeth, the retiring president, said the local association had received much assistance from the provincial and Dominion associations and affiliation money was enjoyed.


