

LOCKOUT THREAT EQUALLY BAD, THOMAS AVERS

Strike Will Cripple Nation No Matter What End

ADDRESSES MEN

Response to Order Marvellous Show of Solidarity Among Unions, He Declares

LONDON, Eng., May 10.—Whatever the end, so far as the nation is concerned, it must be worse after than before the strike. This was one of the statements made Sunday by J. H. Thomas, who as secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen, is the foremost figure on the labor side.

He was addressing a strikers' meeting at Hammersmith, and declared that he had never disguised the fact that he was not in favor of the principle of a general strike, but he maintained that while it was wrong to force the government to negotiate under threat of a strike, it was equally wrong to ask the workers to carry on negotiations under threat of a lock-out.

For a fortnight, Mr. Thomas said, the workers had begged and appealed to the government in vain upon the issue that the coal mine owners should be forced to withdraw their notice, and the negotiations were still proceeding when the Daily Mail incident brought them to a sudden close.

Mr. Thomas declared that the response to the strike order had been the most marvellous demonstration of solidarity the world had ever seen, and had staggered its opponents. Strongly insisting that the Trades Union Council action was not a challenge to the constitution, he warned those who were talking about war, that they were playing with fire, and said that if it was a fight to the finish the country would not be worth having at the end of it.

Police Quell Riot Then Play With Strikers

PLYMOUTH, England, May 10.—After clashing a gang of rowdies who had created a strike disturbance, policemen at Plymouth donned their football clothes and played a match against a team composed of strikers. The game was attended by a delegation of 4,000 striking workers, who marched to the grounds in an orderly procession headed by a brass band.

FIRST ROTOR SHIP NOW AT NEW YORK

Flettner Meets Invention After 6,200-Mile Trip Done in 38 Days

NEW YORK, May 10.—A strange craft neither sailing vessel, nor motorship, but a combination of both came into New York harbor Sunday and evoked as much curiosity from the latter day Manhattanites, as did Henry Hudson's Half Moon from the Indians, 300 years ago. It was the world's first rotor ship, the Baden-Baden of Hamburg.

Flying the flag of the New German republic, she came up the harbor on wind power alone, at a nine knot clip, while tugs and shipping tooted and ferry boat passengers stared. The 600-ton ship, with its two huge rotor towers revolving an average of 80 revolutions a minute, was carrying a cargo of building stone. It completed an experimental trip of 6,200 miles in 38 days.

LABOR PARTY WINS

Retains Majority of Twelve Seats in Queensland General Elections

SYDNEY, Australia, May 10.—The State elections in Queensland have resulted in a parliamentary situation practically the same as before, the Labor Party, which has been in control for several years, retaining a majority of 12 seats.

NEW YORK, May 10.—For keeping ten dogs in his three-room apartment in Brooklyn, William Isinger, 35 years old, was fined \$10 by Magistrate Hunter in Bridge Plaza Court. The charge against him was "crucially to animals."

The idea made Isinger weep, since he would "rather adopt dogs than children," he said.

The court urged that he adopt children rather than dogs. Isinger and his wife occupied two rooms of the apartment and the ten dogs had the third room. An officer of the S. P. C. A. said the dogs looked peaked and worn.

MAN KILLS SELF AND FAMILY BY GAS

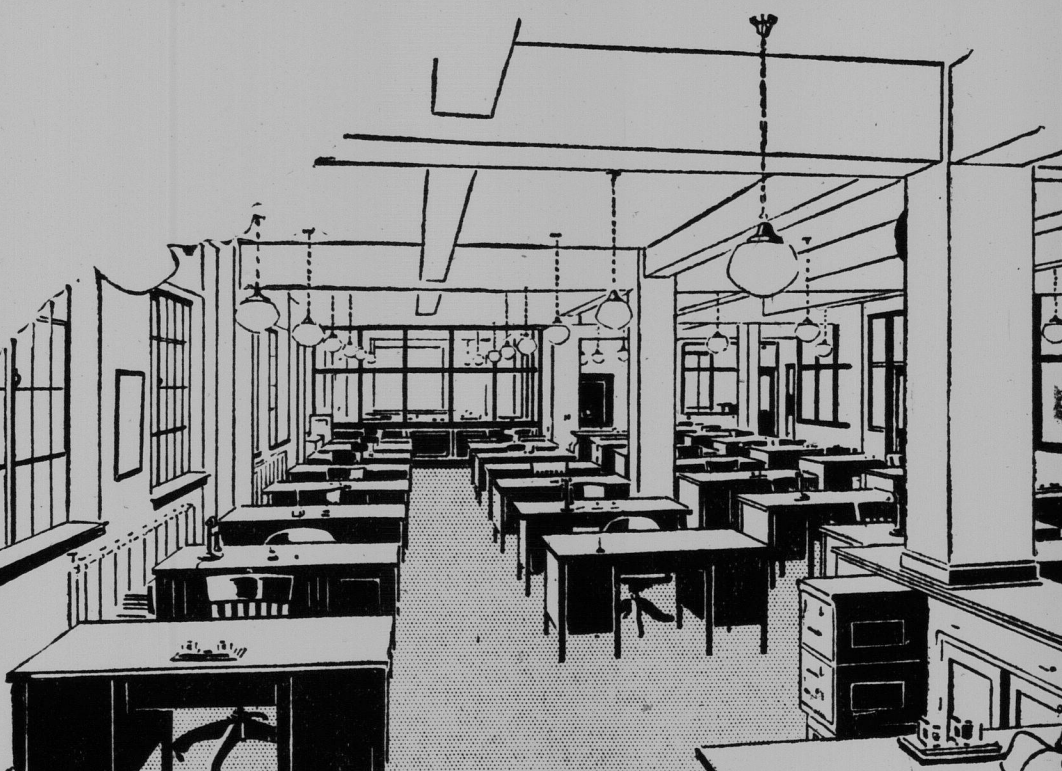
Took Means to Escape Punishment for Operating "Diploma Mill."

MOSCOW, May 10.—The steamer Bledorms, plying between Gomel and Kiev, on the River Dnieper, collided with a barge soon after leaving Gomel yesterday. All passengers on the deck were rescued, while a number of passengers in the lower cabins went down with the vessel. A rescue squad which rushed to the scene saved many of the passengers, but the number who perished were not learned.

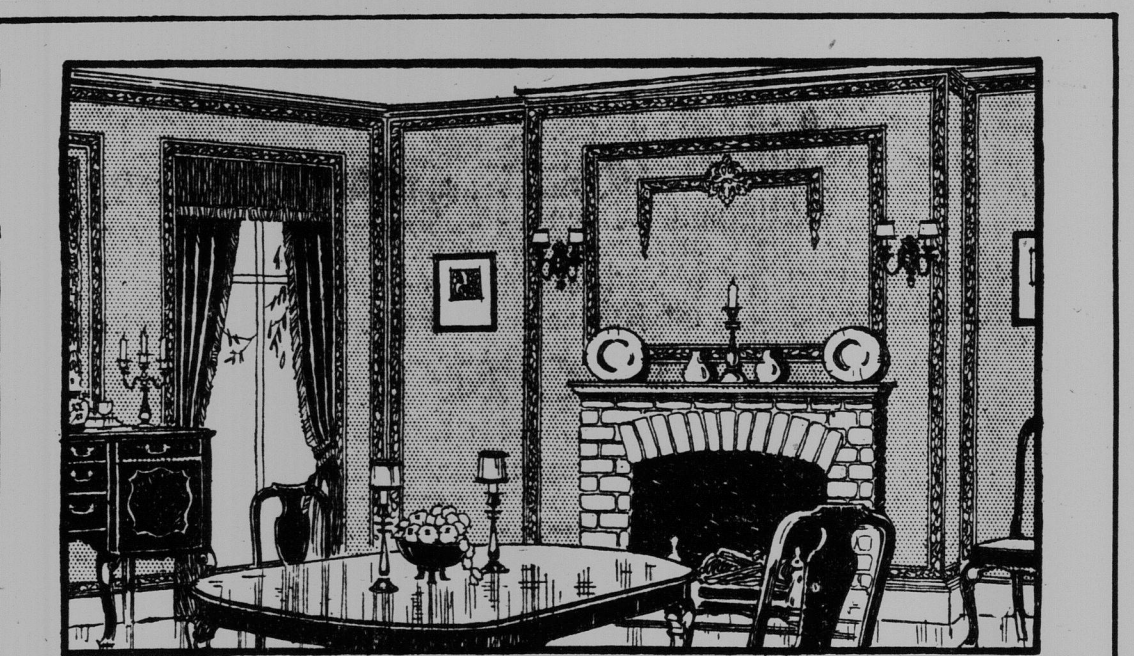

Allen Barnett Remanded Until Tuesday for Hearing of Charge

WOODSTOCK, May 10.—Liquor Inspector J. R. Brown, accompanied by Chief of Police Kelly and Deputy Sheriff Moers, on Saturday, as a result of information, searched the home of Allen Barnett, Lower Woodstock, seven miles below here, and found a half barrel of mash and other evidence of the illicit manufacture of hard liquor. As a result Barnett was brought to Woodstock and appearing before Police Magistrate C. M. Augherston, was remanded to jail till Tuesday. The officers, returning to the scene of the seizure later, found a copper still in the woods adjoining Barnett's home. This was seized and brought to Woodstock by Liquor Inspector Brown.
