TENDERS FOR

STEAMER SERVICE

TO WEST INDIES

The Canadian government is inviting
tenders for a mail passenger and freight
service between the Dominion and the
British West Indies and British Guiana.
Tenders will be received to Jan. 31
next at Ottawa for weekly or fortnight-
ly sailings from St. John, or Halifax, or
alternately from St. John or Halifax.

The amount of subsidy is not stated, but
the steamers employed are to be from
2,000 to 6,000 tons gross and are to pro-
vide accommodation for 100 first class
passengers.

A BIG SEIZURE

IN ST. STEPHEN

St. Stephen, Nov. 16.—An automobile
owned by Thomas Mack, of Providence
(R. I.), and containing twenty cases of
whiskey was seized by the authorities
yesterday on the ground that Mack
had entered Canada without a touring
permit and had used the car for im-
moral purposes. He was not arrested.

Under the Canadian law he can regain
possession of the car by paying its ap-
praised value.

MOVIES NET \$4,186,627.

Famous Players-Lasky Corporation
Issues Nine Months' Statement.

(New York Times.)
The Famous Players-Lasky Corporation's consolidated statement of earnings
covering the nine months ending Octo-
ber 31, 1921, of \$4,186,627. This is
after allowing for all charges, including
reserves for federal income and ex-
cess profits taxes. After allowing for
the payment of dividends on the pre-
ferred stock the above earnings are equal
to an annual rate of \$26.25 a share on
the 206,840 shares of common stock out-
standing.

The board of directors at their meet-
ing yesterday declared the regular quar-
terly dividend of \$2 a share on common
stock payable Jan. 3, 1922, to stock-
holders of record December 15.

WOMAN AND \$20,000

IN DRUGS ARE SEIZED
Raid on New York Flat Reveals Oriental
Luxury and Opium Layout.

(New York Times.)
Two pounds of drugs, valued at \$20,-
000, and an opium layout were seized
yesterday by Detectives from a flat in
the East 100th street, according to the
Division when they raided Mrs. Burke's
flat at 75 Christie street, according to the
Division. Deputy Commissioner Carleton
Simon. He said that the flat was a
clearing house for drug sales in the
Midtown West.

Two weeks ago, said Dr. Simon, word
filtered into headquarters that a Chris-
tian street flat, described as abounding in
Persian draperies and Turkish rugs, was
playing a thriving trade in narcotics. Dr.
Carleton assigned Detective Fred Buck-
ley to the east, and last night the detec-
tive told his chief that the time had ar-
rived for a raid.

Buckley was reinforced by Detectives
Sam Matson and Irving Higgins, and

stairs to the second
