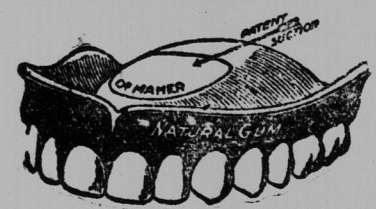

**HOW CUB REPORTER SCOOPED MELVILLE STONE.**  
 Charles Chapin Tells How He "Put It Over" Veteran in Old Chicago Days.

One of the few men who successfully "scooped" Melville E. Stone, now general manager of the Associated Press, is at present serving a life sentence in Sing Sing prison. He is Charles E. Chapin, formerly city editor of the New York Herald Tribune. World, whose extraordinary book describing his life, career, and the tragic events which followed, has just been published by Putnam under the title of "Charles Chapin's Story." Chapin was a cub reporter on the Chicago Tribune when Stone was one of the star men on the Daily News. McGarrigle, the former chief of the corrupt political ring of hoodlums for the corrupt political ring which then largely ruled affairs in Chicago. The newspapers finally forced a grand jury investigation, following which several county commissioners fled the country, and some others together with McGarrigle were jailed, convicted and sentenced to long terms.

Before he was sent to Joliet penitentiary McGarrigle contrived to escape on the schooner Blake through the Great Lakes. Then it was that Stone for the Daily News and Chapin for the Tribune started in pursuit.

Stone went to Mackinaw to head off the fugitive at the Straights, not knowing that the Blake, with McGarrigle aboard,

had slipped through just before. Chapin on a lucky tip proceeded to Port Huron. There he received this telegram from his editor: "Stone wires to Daily News that McGarrigle hasn't passed through the Straights. You are on the wrong track and we are beaten. Come home."

Despite which the cub reporter, risking his job and his last dollar, stayed with it and finally was rewarded by McGarrigle who talked with him freely once he was safe in Canada enabling him to send the news scoop of the season.

"Late in the day, Mr. Stone, still guarding the Straights, telegraphed his minute, and gave instructions to hold enough men to handle the big story he expected to send in after the last regular edition," writes Chapin in his book. "The only one in his office who dared tell him of the Tribune story was Victor Lawson, his partner, who wired him to come home and buy wine."
