FOTBALL.

East vs. West.  
Pasadena, Cal., Nov. 25.—The football team of Ohio State University was formally invited yesterday to represent the state in the annual east and west grid-

iron classis in Pasadena on New Year's day. The expectation here is that the University of California eleven which won the Pacific coast championship last Saturday by defeating Stanford University 35 to 0 will represent the west.

Chicago, Nov. 25.—Ohio State University will ask permission from western conference officials for its football eleven to meet the University of California at Pasadena on New Year's day, "merely as a matter of courtesy and there is no chance of the game being disappointed," so Prof. A. W. Small, University of Chicago representative on the conference faculty board of control said last night.

RING.

Women at Fight.  
New Orleans, Nov. 25.—About twenty women, allowed for the first time in Louisiana prize fighting history to attend a bout, attended a fight between Harry Krohn of Akron last night. Littleton scored a technical knockout in the 12th round of a fifteen round bout. The men are middleweights. Women were assured permission to attend the fight when Judge Skinner, in circuit court yesterday granted A. Pillsbury, one of the promoters of the Winter Garden Arena, which was formally opened with last night's bout, an injunction restraining the superintendent of police from taking any action which would prevent women from attending.

Another Opinion About Brosseau.

Montreal Herald.—It is pretty difficult to tell, on the strength of his exhibition last evening, whether Eugene Brosseau is as good as ever. Before a big crowd of his admirers Eugene boxed three exhibition rounds with Sias Greco at Monument National, but it was Sias who did most of the exhibiting. Green is one of the real comedians of the ring, and his facial contortions, and acrobatic performances along the ropes, were so funny that even Brosseau was chuckling. Green buried things, and so Brosseau got no real opportunity to show one way or the other. There's this to be said for Brosseau: He steps around with the same speed as of yore. His footwork is as fast as ever. Last night the hoppers were equipped with heavy gloves and his punches lacked, perhaps for this reason, their old-time snap. His left hand is far from being powerless and he used it for both jabbing and hooking. But the only way to tell whether Brosseau is "back" is to see him box. Last night's exhibition was not convincing.

Captain Roper Wins.

Boston, Nov. 24.—Capt. Bob Roper of Chicago gained the referee's decision over Bob Martin, champion of the A. E. F. in their fast ten-round bout to night. Seven of the rounds went to Roper, who fought well to the inside of Martin's guard, using a left jab to good advantage. Martin set a fast pace

when the men met for the first round, but he took a right hook to the heart in the second that slowed him up for the remainder of the bout.

WRESTLING.

Bout in Brandon.  
Brandon, Man., Nov. 25.—Olson defeated Arthur in two straight falls here last night, winning the middleweight wrestling championship of Canada, the first fall coming after thirty-four minutes and the second in nine minutes. Arthur said that injuries to his neck, sustained in the last bout here, handicapped him.

TURF.

Big Money at The Race Meets.  
Toronto, Nov. 25.—Almost eight million dollars was wagered in three Ontario race meets during the last racing season, according to statistics issued yesterday from the provincial treasurers department. At the Hamilton Jockey Club fall meeting the total was \$2,062,109 and at the September Windsor meet the grand total was \$3,607,770.

Jack Glassford Dead.

Chatham, Ont., Nov. 25.—"Jack" Glassford died at his home here yesterday. For several years he owned some of the fastest horses in the province. His services were also in great demand as a starter at horse races. He was sixty-three years old.

GOLF.

\$5,000 Auto For Evans.  
Toronto, Nov. 25.—In appreciation of his bringing back the national amateur golf championship to the Edgewater Golf Club, the members of that organization last Saturday night presented a \$5,000 automobile to "Chick" Evans. The question now rises whether the club violated the amateur rule of the United States Golf Association, either in letting or giving, or both. No doubt the association will not look with great favor on this presentation.

BASEBALL.

Cobb Attracts 30,000 Fans.  
Ty Cobb played to 30,000 folks in one of the two games in San Francisco and one in Oakland. He outdrew what Ruth did last year by a big margin. Cobb and Ruth are different in every way. Bull players and those who know inside base-

ball appreciate Cobb's work, while Big Babe gives even those who know nothing about baseball a thrill when he pumps a ball out of the lot.

Cobb is great, doing everything, while Babe is in a class all by himself as a home-run hitter. Cobb will play in Los Angeles, and if things break right he may play a return engagement in San Francisco before he goes to his Georgia home.
