THE EMPRESS INVESTIGATION

Quebec, June 17.—Alfred Tuftness, first officer of the Storstad, took his place in the witness box when the Empress enquiry was opened this morning, and Butler Aspinall, K.C., began his cross-examination on behalf of the C. P. R. The witness was in charge of the collision immediately prior to the collision.

Mr. Aspinall began by asking the witness if he knew whether the master of the Storstad got a bonus for a speedy trip with coal for the Dominion Coal Co. between Sydney and Montreal. He said he did not know. Lord Mercer said the matter could be easily cleared up, and asked C. A. Height, a New York lawyer, acting for the owners of the Storstad, whether he knew.

Mr. Height at once put the question to Captain Anderson, who was sitting in the well of the court, and received a reply in the negative.
