Strapped to War Plane, Camp Cook Spy Once More Lands in War-
racked Belgium; Terrific Scenes Within Liege Forts!

(This spy fled to America to escape the governments of two nations. He knows that secret agents are watching him still. This story was secured from him in a village in Pennsylvania. His story lacks literary quality, but it is filled with interesting and first-hand information regarding the early developments of the European war.)

At six o'clock that evening I was awakened from my heavy sleep to find two men entering my room. The room was in semi-darkness. Outside I could hear the steady murmuring roar of troops going forward.

Half awake I was alarmed. One man spoke. He was of the service seldom reported direct in times of peace, but through other men. Many times we did not know who received reports. I was being paid a high honor—to have staff officers call upon me.

They had come for further details. For three hours I gave them in detail all I knew of the situation in Liege.

"You must go back," said my superior officer. "We have arranged."

I inquired for him diligently and finally he was directed toward the fort and found him in a group. I rushed upon him, beseeching his aid. Truly my appearance was convincing. I learned later and he was, and besides the ride in the aero and the night spent in the fields and ditches had not improved my appearance. gun works, and the iron works of the city. The chimneys of the gun works, where most of Belgium's cannon were made, offered the most striking feature of the skyline—and most of them had been shot away.

I arrived at the hotel panting, found my officer collecting things he had left in his rooms at the deserted hotel and cursing. He gave his bags into my care. I thought we were going to Brussels. The Belgian troops withdrew from Liege were retreating in that direction.

I learned that the French plan to give battle at Liege had been abandoned when the strength of the German army was developed, and that Namur was to be the centre of the great battle.

There were curses among the men because the British had failed to make haste, and much discontent that the French had not made a stand with the Belgians at the Meuse around Liege.

The French seemed eager to fight but their officers, knowing the strength of the German advance, would have her army in the field. During this trip I pretended to sleep, while listening to my officers talking, but really slept, woken out, and snored so lustily they kicked me.
