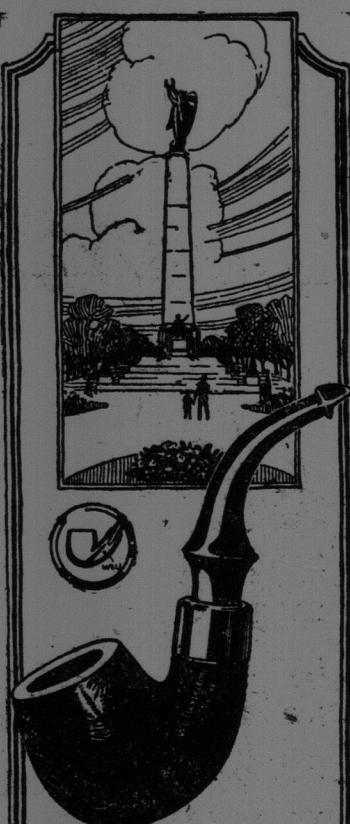

Warwickshire defeated Derbyshire by eight wickets, scoring 164 and thirty-five for two wickets against eighty and 118. Howell of Warwickshire had twelve wickets for sixty-four.

Bridges for Somerset took six wickets for nineteen in the first innings and Parker for Gloucestershire took eight for forty-five. The scores were: Somerset 111 and 161; Gloucestershire, 77 and 186 for nine wickets.
