GAMBLING AT SARATOGA MUST STOP, SAYS SMITH

Governor Warns Authorities—Threatens to Use State Troops.

Albany, June 10.—The gambling scandals which were a feature of last year's racing season at Saratoga Springs will not be repeated this year. If Governor Smith has his way.

The governor informed the district attorney and sheriff of Saratoga County that unless gambling dens are closed and kept closed he will supersede the authority of the two officials and police the city with state troops.

The governor's action is taken as the result of a complaint by the Saratoga Chamber of Commerce declaring that gambling houses were permitted to run on a large scale at Saratoga last year. It was declared that the city during this period was crowded with gambling resorts operating with the brazenness featuring the palmist days of the Canfield era.

Nothing definite has been presented to the governor which would lead him to believe that the local authorities were not doing their best to close the gambling houses, but lack of ability to enforce the law will not be accepted as an excuse by the governor.

In his letter the governor said: "I desire to give you sufficient notice that gambling houses must not be tolerated at Saratoga, New York's great health resort. If there is any indication, based upon evidence, of a renewal of the activities of gambling houses complained of, I shall feel compelled to relieve you from duty in the premises and police the city with the state troops."

FRENCH AIRPLANE GOLIATH MAKES NON-STOP RECORD

Remains in Air 24 Hours 19 Minutes and Covers 1,915 Kilometres.

Paris, June 10.—The airplane Goliath, piloted by Lieut. Bessoulet and Bernaud, has broken the world's record for continuous flight. It remained in the air twenty-four hours, nineteen minutes, seven seconds, covering a distance of 1,915.5 kilometres.

The Goliath also established what are said to be records for 1,000 and 1,500 kilometres, making the former in eleven hours, twenty-nine minutes and fifty-six seconds and the latter in sixteen hours, forty-two minutes eight seconds.

The flight was made at Stamps, near Paris. The former record for continuous flight was held by a German, W. Landmann, who remained in the air twenty-one hours, forty-eight minutes, forty seconds in June, 1914.

HELD UP BY BANDITS

Husband and Wife Tied Together by Auto Robbers.

Pittsfield, Mass., June 10.—Three masked automobile bandits at the point of revolvers held up and robbed Mr. and Mrs. Leon J. Hazelton in their home at "Jacob's Well" on the state highway in Berkshire. After ransacking the house and taking between \$75 and \$100, the bandits, according to the story told to State Detective Thomas G. Blight, of this city, bound and gagged Mr. and Mrs. Hazelton in chains, back to back, and then left the premises, going towards Springfield, Mass. Mrs. Hazelton succeeded in unloosening the ropes and Mr. Hazelton telephoned word to the Westfield police, but no trace of the bandits could be found.

THEIR AUTOS IMPOUNDED.

Speeders in Winnipeg Being Fitfully Punished.

Winnipeg, June 10.—The campaign against speeders in this city has resulted in four men being deprived of their automobiles for one week. After imposing fines varying from \$25 to \$53, Magistrate Sir Hugh John Macdonald ordered that their cars be impounded in accordance with an order issued May 31, that all speeders going more than twenty-five miles an hour after June 1 would have their cars impounded.

DISCREET JOURNALIST.

German Declines to Visit French Devastated Regions.

Paris, June 10.—Dr. Alexander Riddick, chief political writer of the Berlin Vossische Zeitung, and the first German newspaperman to come to Paris since the war, has been offered facilities for observing the situation in France. He came here on special permission of the French government, but has declined to accept an invitation of the government to visit the devastated regions.

KILLED BY BLOW OF BEAR.

Prince Rupert, B. C., June 10.—Clarence Thompson, a logger on Chicago Island, died recently from wounds inflicted by a large brown bear. Terribly lacerated, Thompson was found by a searching party, to whom he gave a connected account of his experience before he died.

Unexpectedly he came upon the bear while it was feeding on the carcass of a deer. It rushed at him and he shot once before the huge paw landed with smashing force on his face.

The animal knocked and buffeted him about for a time and then walked away. When found Thompson had not a stitch of clothing on his body and he had suffered terribly from cold and loss of blood.

NO PLACE FOR A SHY MAN.

London, Eng., June 10.—On the ground that he was too bashful, and that a woman was better fitted for the job, Councillor Everett resigned from the Maternity and Child Welfare Committee in favor of Mrs. Cooke. He said he often blushed at the meetings.

WOMEN CAN VOTE JULY TENTH

Thousands of women who did not register in previous elections will be delighted to learn that they still have an opportunity of getting on the list and voting for prohibition. To be eligible one must be twenty-one years of age and a resident of the province for six months, and make an affidavit to this effect before any justice of the peace, which includes the mayor and commissioners. A copy of this affidavit must be forwarded to the Board of Revision in the parish in which they live two weeks prior to the date of the election.

MEMORIAL HALL

Carman, Man., June 10.—Premier T. C. Norris, of Manitoba, recently participated in a historical day for the municipality of Dufferin and the town of Carman, when he opened the new memorial hall here. The building is of red brick with stone facings. Aside from the memorial tribute the building is a magnificent effort to promote a community spirit. The cost was \$80,000, divided between the town and the municipality. Over 400 men enlisted from the Carman-Dufferin district, eighty-five of whom were killed in action.

Lucky He Wanted Match.

Smith Centre, Kan., June 9.—Not having a match to light a cigar saved the life of a fireman on one of the locomotives attached to a train that had been stalled near here. Leaving the cab of the engine, he started back to get a light. He had hardly reached the second car from the tender when the engine boiler blew up, destroying the locomotive.

WILL RUN AGAIN FOR MAYORALTY.

Winnipeg, June 10.—S. J. Farmer, who opposed Mayor Gray at the last civic elections, again will be advanced as a Labor candidate for mayor at the elections for 1921, Labor aldermen predict. "I believe Labor will again control the council next year," Alderman John Blumberg declared. He said if Labor candidates were elected every dollar would be spent advantageously to the city as a whole and no section would be given preference. "I believe Winnipeg would appreciate a Labor council," Alderman Blumberg continued. "It would endeavor to keep the tax rate down to a minimum and I believe some civic grants favored in the past would be discontinued."

GOLDEN WEDDING RECORD.

London, Eng., June 10.—In 1868 Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Gurnton celebrated their golden wedding. Their son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Jabez Gurnton, in their turn, have now celebrated their golden wedding. All the nine children of the marriage were present.

SALE OF ESSENCES IS CONTROLLED IN B. C.

Victoria, B. C., June 10.—On the first of May the remaining four sections of the amendments to the British Columbia prohibition act, passed at the recent session of the legislature, went into effect. It is not possible to obtain a prescription for more than eight ounces of liquor now save and excepting under the special conditions set out in the amended statute. Sale of tinctures and essences are similarly regulated. It is also impossible to obtain delivery of liquor from a local warehouse within the province, and all manufacturers of near-beer must label their bottles and barrels with the name of the brewery from whence the product comes.

THE COCKROACH KING.

London, Eng., June 9.—The St. Pancras council meeting was asked to take steps to check the increase of cockroaches at public baths. One of the councilmen said that there was formerly a professional cockroach killer in the borough but he did so well that he retired from business.
