

WESTERNERS REPLY

Hope For C.M.A.'s Assistance
Toward British Free Trade.

WILL BE GLAD OF HELP

Grain-growers' Guide Says the Farmers Look Forward to Eventual Free Trade With the Mother Country as a Means of Binding Together the Empire and Also Reducing Cost of Living in Canada.

Winnipeg, Sept. 28.—The Grain-growers' Guide has issued the following statement in reply to the offer of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association for a conference with the farmers on closer trade with Great Britain:

"Western grain-growers have repeatedly declared for an increased British preference, and an eventually free trade with the Motherland. If the Canadian Manufacturers' Association is prepared to assist the grain-growers towards this end, there is no doubt but that the grain-growers will be glad of the assistance of the manufacturers, as they realize the manufacturers have great influence in tariff-making. Free trade with the Motherland would reduce the cost of living to every Canadian, and bind closer the greatest overseas Dominion with Great Britain. Every loyal Canadian is glad to know that the Manufacturers' Association is not opposed to lower taxes on British imports. If the association is prepared for a conference with the producers to assist in securing free trade with Great Britain in ten years it will be a welcome message to every western grain-grower."

Not Serious Enough.
Ottawa, Sept. 28.—A number of the manufacturers who were present on Thursday morning when the appeal of the Western Grain-Growers for co-operation in promoting practical Imperial unity by increasing the British preference was greeted with derisive laughter, and rather humorously disposed of, have since expressed the opinion that the association made a tactical mistake in not dealing with the question a little more seriously.

Life Term For Ferguson.
Detroit, Sept. 28.—The first murder trial in Michigan in recent years that involved the possibility of capital punishment for the accused, resulted yesterday in life imprisonment at Fort Leavenworth, Kas., when a jury in the U. S. District Court found W. A. Ferguson guilty of killing Canada Immigration Inspector H. C. Herber on July 25, on a ferryboat plying between Detroit and Windsor, Ont. The jury recommended life imprisonment. Ferguson shot down the inspector a few moments after he had been refused admission into Canada because of physical defects. He blamed the inspector for causing his return to Detroit.

Too Much Mercy With Justice.
Woodstock, Sept. 28.—After having in his custody two men now believed to have been daring crooks, who were discovered in the office of the Drummond skating rink Thursday evening during a concert, the constable of the village allowed his prisoners to go without making further enquiries, and the police of this county now believe that an important capture has been "missed." The men were in the act of robbing the till when caught. Because they had not succeeded in getting any money the constable allowed them to go.

Rogers at Helm in Macdonald.
Winnipeg, Sept. 28.—Hon. Robert Rogers arrived here yesterday morning from Montreal to assist the Conservative candidate in Macdonald by-election, and express his entire satisfaction with Alex. Morrison as the party nominee.

"Did" Europe For \$87.
London, Sept. 28.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—William Lucas of Toronto, a student, leaves for home per a cattle boat today, having visited every country generally associated with a "grand tour" and spent only \$87. He claims the previous record for such a cheap journey over for a hundred dollars.

BARN BURNED IN NORTH OXFORD

Disastrous Fire Yesterday Afternoon on the Farm of Ambrose Upfold—The Origin Unknown

A disastrous fire occurred about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, on the farm of Mr. Ambrose Upfold, 50 in Oxford, one mile north of Putnam, a large bank barn, 200 pen and driving shed being destroyed. The origin of the fire is unknown. The loss is heavy as Mr. Upfold only threshed last week and the contents were destroyed. Mr. Upfold was at work in a field when the fire broke out and Mrs. Upfold and family were away from home. The buildings were insured in the Niagara Insurance Company.

ROCKEFELLER RECALLS DAYS WHEN HE EARNED \$50 IN THREE MONTHS.
Cleveland, Sept. 26.—John D. Rockefeller, dealer in oil and gasoline on Thursday celebrated the 61st anniversary of his first job. Plugs waved at Forest Hill in commemoration of the event, and John D. took a walk over the golf links, recalling the thirteen-year-old youngster who entered the office of Hewitt & Tuttle, forwarding commission men back in 1855.

SECRETARIES NAMED

Moral Reform Board Will Have Three New Representatives.

AGAINST INDIAN SHOWS

Government Will Be Asked to Prevent Parades of Braves in War Paint at Celebrations—Mr. Rowell's Policy Is Commended—Certificates of Health Before Marriage Is the Subject of a Resolution.

Toronto, Sept. 28.—Three new secretaries were appointed by the Methodist branch of temperance and moral reform. A great educational campaign is to be held throughout the Dominion and Newfoundland, which is included in the Methodist general conference. The campaign will not be immediately directed towards seeking changes in the laws, beyond seeking the appointment of the board of censors for theatres as announced yesterday.

Rev. Dr. Moore was authorized to confer with the Governments of the respective provinces to ask them to have an investigation by a commission to report on the advisability of making it compulsory for medical certificates of freedom from contagious disease, necessary before marriage licenses are issued.

The new secretaries will be: Rev. J. H. Macdonald, Toronto, for Ontario; Rev. J. Garbutt, Cobourg, for the western provinces; Rev. W. J. Smith, Hamilton, for the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland. It was agreed to co-operate with the Presbyterian board in establishing rescue homes for girls.

A resolution commending N. W. Rowell's "banish the bar" policy was adopted. A protest will be sent to Ottawa against Indians being granted leave to take part in parades in their war paint at fairs, and expressing regret that this took place during the visit of the Duke of Connaught at Calgary.

The Dominion Government will be asked to make the law respecting seduction by certain employers general, so that it would include restaurant keepers. This was on account of allegations respecting the employment of white waitresses in Chinese restaurants.

The moral reform magazine to be issued by the branch, is to be started in January. A resolution commending the Women's National Council's efforts to protect feeble-minded girls was adopted. Hon. Sam Hughes will be asked to stop the serving of liquors at the officers' and sergeants' messes in barracks and armories, as well as at annual camps.

The question of international peace was discussed, a resolution being adopted condemning "jingoism" in the form of talk of war between England and Germany, and declaring in favor of the principle of arbitration of all matters of dispute between nations.

Man Caught Not the One.
Seattle, Wn., Sept. 28.—The man arrested in St. Louis, according to detectives directing the search here, is not Al. Addison, alias Albert Anderson, the lack of the trio believed to have committed the actual robbery of the New Westminster Bank.

HAND INJURED

AN ANVIL FELL ON RIGHT HAND OF HALEY MCMURRAY AND FINGERS WERE CRUSHED.

While assisting the Human Engine Company in the Town Hall Friday morning Haley McMurray, son of Marshall McMurray, met with a painful accident. He was pulling on a heavy anvil that is used in the play when it fell over on his right hand. One finger was badly crushed and another nearly severed. It is not thought however that amputation of the finger will be necessary.

THE MARKET

The attendance at the market today was no as large as a week ago. There was, however, a noticeable increase in the supply of poultry, chickens and ducks being fairly plentiful. Prices were much the same as last week.
