Last Week's Fire

Judge Oke visited Bay Roberts on Tuesday last and conducted an enquiry into the cause of the fire which destroyed the residence of Mr. Jas. Joy last week. The insurance on the house was \$2,000, and on the furniture \$300.

It was well for the people living east of the Cross Roads that a high wind was not blowing and that it was blowing in the direction that it was. Had it been blowing a little more westerly the chances are that the R. C. church would have been destroyed as well as a number of dwellings and stores east and south of the church.

The property owners especially of Bay Roberts are vitally interested in the matter of fire protection, and as the Guardian has attention to this matter before their attention in the past, so we again desire to impress upon them the great need there is of a fire fighting apparatus for Bay Roberts.

We are almost ashamed to mention it, but it is a fact that in this comparatively thickly-populated and important town we have not even a few buckets or a ladder or two for use in case of a fire, and consequently when a fire does occur we are almost entirely at the mercy of the elements.

We are pathetic in this connection to a degree almost inconceivable, and we seem to be waiting for a general conflagration such as visited St. John's in 1892 before we take any action.

The City of St. John's can have its up-to-date Fire Department, with fire halls, chemical engines, steam engines, hoses, ladders, hose trucks and an efficient fire brigade, the expenses of the upkeep of which are borne almost entirely by the government, the money coming out of the general revenue, while the citizens of Bay Roberts have not 'gumption' enough to demand a few buckets and a ladder or two.

Don't let us wait until the horse is stolen to lock the stable door, but let us ask for and demand from the government a fire engine, hose, ladders, etc.

Bad Times

According to a letter received recently we learn that times are very poor in Vancouver, B. C. A great many halibut boats are tied up and will remain so for the season. Some of the halibut steamers are beginning to bring in good trips both at Vancouver and Seattle, but things remain quiet.

Obituary

The grim reaper, Death, has been very busy the past few weeks amongst the more aged citizens of this community, and five have been called to their eternal reward. On Monday morning, May 25th, there passed peacefully away Robert Hayes, aged 88 years. Deceased was born in 1826, and was the son of the late Benjamin Hayes, of Sussex, England.

Robert Hayes was one of our oldest and most industrious of our fishermen, being actively engaged in the fishery business of this country for about 60 years. He leaves a wife, one son, John, one daughter, Julia, residing in Boston, and 11 grandchildren to mourn their loss. The funeral took place to the Methodist Cemetery, Coley's Point, on Wednesday afternoon, May 27th, at 2.30 o'clock, Rev. Wm. Grimes officiating.

The community of Butlerstown was startled on Tuesday of last week by the sudden death of Patrick Butler, a highly-respected resident of that locality. Deceased was ill but a short time having contracted erysipelas about a week before, causing his death at the age of 55 years. Mr. Butler was a faithful son of toil, spending the majority of years at the fishery, and altho his efforts to obtain the necessities of life were not always smiled upon by Dame Fortune, he never complained but fought with grim determination to succeed.

He was also the proud possessor of honest and upright qualities, sterling character and a kindly and hospitable disposition and favorably impressed and endeared himself to all who knew him.

He leaves to mourn a widow, two sons, Edward and Michael, and one daughter, Annie, three brothers, Joseph, John and Michael, and three sisters, Mrs. Franey and Mrs. Parsons of Butlerstown, Mrs. Henry Dawe, Coley's Pt.

His funeral took place on Friday, and was large and representative. The body was conveyed to the R. C. Church where Requiem Mass was celebrated, after which the funeral proceeded to the cemetery for interment, Rev. Dr. Whelan officiating—Requiescant in pace.

Road Making and Road Repairing

The usual work on the public roads took place this week, and as usual there is not enough money to do the work thoroughly. A lot of drainage work needs to be attended to, but it must lay over for want of money. The road opposite the residence of Joseph Bishop is patched up, only to be undermined again by the first heavy sea that dashes against the wall. Once or twice every season this piece of road has to be attended to, and we think it would be just as well if some effort was made to deal with it in a more effective way.

If a little more money was spent in that section and something more permanent done we would have more money left to spend on portions of the roads which must of necessity be attended to.

There is such a thing as being a penny wise and a pound foolish, and this applies to the section above referred to. Let some citizen come forward with a suggestion in reference to road-making and road-repairing on an economical basis. In Canada and the United States the road question is a very important and live one, and a great deal of attention and time is given to this matter. As it is just as important a question in this country, and as road-making and road-repairing costs this country thousands and thousands of dollars annually, we invite the readers of the Guardian to send us for publication their views on Road Making and Road Repairing.
