RESULTS OF TODAY'S POLLING IN THE LOCAL OPTION CONTESTS IN FOUR WARDS

REPORTED MURDER OF HUNDREDS OF YOUNG TURKS

Prince of Samos Also Assassinated—Sultan Having Trouble in Finding Men to Form New Government—Still Much Uneasiness

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 20.—Further proof of the unlikelihood of resistance to the Young Turk's army and of the desire of the authorities to appease the Salonikins is found in the orders issued today for the preparation of military trains for the transport of 6,000 troops of the Constantinople garrison to Anatolia. This will mean the removal from the capital of all participants in Tuesday's revolt. It is expected that the invading troops will enter the city on tomorrow or Thursday, the right wing by way of Stamboul, seizing the war office, the Porte and parliament, the left wing crossing the Sweet Waters to secure the heights above the Yildiz Pera and the Bosphorus, while the centre will devote itself to maintaining order and preventing any attempt at pillage.

BERLIN, April 20.—A despatch to the Local Anzinger from Constantinople says that it is rumored Mehmed Rehad Friend, the heir apparent to the throne, has been proclaimed Sultan at Saloniki. The Local Anzinger's local Saloniki correspondent says that it is intended to establish the provisional government at that place.

FIVE THOUSAND BALES OF COTTON BURNED

Hamburg-American Liner Ashore—King and Queen in Sicily—Epsom Races.

CUXHAVEN, April 20.—The Hamburg American line steamer Amerika from New York April 19 for Hamburg, is aground off Althorn, four miles south of here. Tugs are standing by to render assistance.

GIRGENTI, Sicily, April 20.—The Royal Yacht Victoria and Albert with King Edward and Queen Alexandra on board, arrived here today from Genoa. Their Majesties are cruising in the Mediterranean.

WIFE OF WEALTHY CHINESE MERCHANT DEAD IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Ill., April 20.—Mrs. Moy Tong Hoy, wife of one of the richest Chinese merchants in Chicago, and well known as the "Queen of Chinatown," is dead from pulmonary troubles. She was 64 years of age and a student in Notre Dame University.

WILL PUNISH PROMOTERS OF THE LYNCHING PARTY

GUTHRIE, Okla., April 20.—Gov. Haskell declares that those implicated in the lynching of four men at Ada yesterday will be punished to the full extent of the law. An official investigation, it was announced, will be made. Adjutant General Canfield says that to his personal knowledge, J. B. Miller, one of the men lynched, had killed 13 men in Texas and that he had always escaped punishment.

LAKE SEAMEN ORDERED TO VOTE ON A STRIKE

CHICAGO, April 20.—At a meeting of the Lake Seamen's Union last night orders were issued to the seamen at all points around the Lakes to take a referendum vote on a strike. The Chicago men will vote on Wednesday and the results from the other ports will be known by the end of the week. The marine firemen and the cooks have already voted and are refusing to ship on any boats controlled by members of the Lake Carriers Association. "We stand ready to meet a committee from the Lake Carriers Association in joint conference," said Secretary O. Lander, "but the vessel owners have not replied to our invitation for such a meeting which was sent to them April 14th."

WESTON STARTS AGAIN

CHICAGO, April 20.—Edward Weston after a rest in Chicago since last Saturday afternoon, following the New York to Chicago section of his coast to coast walk, resumed his tramp at six o'clock this morning. Plans had been made to resume his journey last night at 9 o'clock, but at the last moment the walker's manager was unable to obtain an automobile and a chauffeur to take the place of the one discharged Saturday.

BERLIN, April 20.—The Mottek slander case, a sequel to the Zu Eulen-berg affair, and the "round table" scandals of 1907, again came up for trial in Berlin today.
