shal French's Staff, Report Troops Move Rapidly Over Frozen Roads of East Prussia in Advance on Carcrow -Battle Which May Decide Struggle in Eastern Area Expected on German Side of Frontier.

Petrograd, Nov. 16 (via London)—The Ru,ssian advance in East Prussia, according to advices received here from the front, is being assisted materially by cold weather, which enables the troops to move more rapidly. In the swampy lake region of East Prussia, movements of the army have been retarded by soft roads. This mud has now been removed by the cold weather, which has frozen the roads.

A fall of snow during the last two days is reported over the entire field of operations, but not to a sufficient extent to prove a serious obstacle to the movement of troops.
