

AN UNEVENTFUL DAY IN WAR THEATRES; NO CHANGE IN SITUATION, PARIS REPORTS

INDIA TROOPS DEFEAT TURKS IN TWO ACTIONS

London, Nov. 17.—It is officially announced that since the occupation of Fao, at the head of the Persian gulf, by a British Indian force on November 8, two actions have been fought with the Turkish forces, who on both occasions have been severely handled and defeated after stubborn resistance.

Continued from page 1. by the Germans, and the latter bombarding some high ground and the valley to the east of it in our possession. Three machine guns were captured by us during the day. On our centre there was a recrudescence of activity on the enemy's part. During the previous night some six battalions of Saxons had succeeded in capturing some of our trenches, only to be driven out by a counter-attack, which resulted in one officer and several men being taken prisoners.

Enemy's Casualties 1,200 in one Day. "These strong attacks were accompanied or preceded by attempts to break through at other points, which were usually attended with heavy loss. An instance of the cost to the enemy of these subsidiary operations occurred on this day, when one of our battalions killed forty-seven Germans—this number being actually counted in front of our trenches—and captured fifty-one. It is calculated that on Sunday their casualties in killed and wounded in front of one small section of our line were about 1,200.

attack on the British outposts. On the 14th, further reinforcements arrived from India, and the following day the Indians, commanded by General Delamain, sortied and attacked the Turks occupying a post about four miles distant, assisted by the sloop Espliego and Odin.

The enemy's camp was captured and many prisoners and guns were taken. The British casualties were two officers wounded and eight men killed and fifty one wounded.

Monday, the ninth, was a comparatively quiet day. On our left, the shelling was less in this direction. The Germans, for the time being, desisted from making attacks in force, and confined their efforts to minor assaults and the wanton destruction of Ypres, venting them from sleeping than with any other object. Night Attacks to Keep Allies from Securing Needed Rest. "On our right, during the night of November 8-9, a German trench was captured; otherwise the situation did not alter. Night attacks have been of regular occurrence at different points, and are made apparently more with a view to annoying our troops and preventing them from sleeping than with any other object. Sometimes, of course the advance has been of a more serious nature, and has been carried out by large bodies.

Similar tactics were a feature of the fighting on the Aisne, and to judge by the diaries we have obtained from German soldiers their utility is fully appreciated by the men. They are usually made from trenches in the rear of the front line, the latter being only slightly held. The front lines of both sides are now, at many points, so close that our men amuse themselves by listening to what goes on in the enemy's trenches.

On the other hand, too, much should not be made of these sidelights on the present condition of the enemy. They are still fighting with a stubbornness and recklessness, which, whatever its utility, is remarkable when exhibited by forces of which a large proportion consists of comparatively untrained men.

PRINCE OF WALES GOING TO FRONT COLD WEATHER AN AID TO RUSSIAN ADVANCE

London, Nov. 14 (4.45 p.m.)—The Prince of Wales, according to a report current here today, will soon go to the front. He will be attached to the staff of Field Marshal Sir John French.

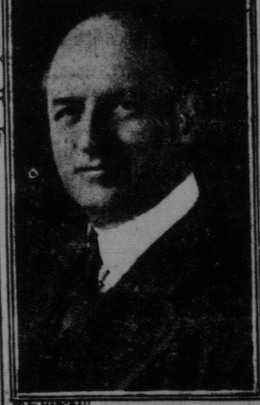
FUNERAL SERVICE FOR LORD ROBERTS IN LONDON

INOCULATION IS NOT COMPULSORY

Militia Department at Ottawa Denies Deaths at Valcartier from Inoculation. Special to The Standard. Ottawa, Nov. 16.—Reports sent out from Kingston that some of the volunteers for overseas service are being sent home because they refuse to be inoculated against typhoid, and that several men died from such inoculation at Valcartier are declared at the Militia Department to be untrue. The inoculation is not compulsory and no deaths occurred at Valcartier from this cause.

TROOPS MOVE RAPIDLY OVER FROZEN ROADS OF EAST PRUSSIA IN ADVANCE ON CARCROW — BATTLE WHICH MAY DECIDE STRUGGLE IN EASTERN AREA EXPECTED ON GERMAN SIDE OF FRONTIER.

Petrograd, Nov. 16 (via London)—The Russian advance in East Prussia, according to advices received here from the front, is being assisted materially by cold weather, which enables the troops to move more rapidly. In the swampy lake region of East Prussia, movements of the army have been retarded by soft roads. This mud has now been removed by the cold weather, which has frozen the roads.

THE GOEBEN AND BRESLAU BACK IN THE BOSPHORUS.

London, Nov. 16.—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Athens says: "The Turks lost 250 men and two guns destroyed in the bombardment of the forts of the Dardanelles. "The former German cruisers Goeben and Breslau, which now fly the Turkish flag, have re-entered the Bosphorus."

FIND BODIES OF MEN DROWNED FROM SCHOONER ADVOCATE

TICKET AGENT CHARGED WITH HIGH TREASON IS SENT UP FOR TRIAL

Former Interpreter Pleads Not Guilty of Helping Enemies of Empire to Leave Canada. Montreal, Nov. 16.—Israel Schaefer, ticket agent, and former court house interpreter, charged with high treason, in aiding the King's enemies, providing transportation to subjects of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy, telling them to represent themselves to Canadian and American authorities as Roumanian subjects, appeared before Judge Leet in voluntary statement this morning. He pleaded not guilty to the charge and was remanded for trial at the March term of the Court of King's Bench.

CANADIANS MERRY IN SPITE OF BAD WEATHER

London, Nov. 16.—The Daily Mail correspondent, who visited the Salisbury Camps at the week-end, found that despite the mud, damp and cold, the Canadians were the merriest of merry fellows, playing rugby in the thick mud, and singing their national songs. Already five thousand men have taken possession of the huts erected at Bulford Camp, which, in addition to their greater comfort and protection, brings the soldiers nearer to the railway. The war office has 800 men at work building more, and hope before the end of the month to accommodate the whole contingent in these huts.

MAY PUBLISH THE QUOTATIONS OF UNLISTED STOCKS.

New York, Nov. 13.—The committee of five of the New York stock exchange took up the matter of reporting quotations of unlisted stocks and, after discussing the matter representatives of the committee stated that they had no objection to reporting quotations of stocks not listed on the New York stock exchange.

The matter is one in which the stock exchange can take no positive action in the way of a ruling, but the fact that it does not object to publication of unlisted quotations leaves a clear field for the reporting of outside markets.

This does not apply of course to transactions in the open trading of so-called new street market in which transactions in listed stocks have been made.

Governors of the New York stock exchange confirm recent statements that the Clearing House Association and New York stock exchange authorities have been working together all through the period of business suspension and that the co-operation of the two institutions is now stronger than ever before in that period.

They said that the assertions that a consideration of the reopening of the stock exchange is out of the question are without the slightest foundation and that the recent steps all tend to a resumption of business on the board room floor.
