The Supreme Court Decision Although but four provinces were em-braced when the B. N. A. act first came into operation it was expressly declared in the preamble that it was expedient that provisions be made for the eventual admission into the union through procla-mation, all other parts of British North America. It was the declared intention that all parts be embraced, and the act was so framed that this intention might be carried out without further imperial legislation, and they were called upon to interpret and construe the act that this intention might be accomplished. The in-tentions of parliament ought to be carried out. The word "Canada" in the act shi first meant the four provinces, but since
