INDIAN MISSIONS.

A careful review of the Indian Work, whether in its religious, educational, or secular aspect, will show that during the past year it has been well sustained by the judicious and faithful labours of the brethren, whom the Conference appointed to teach the Sons of the Forest the way to the Cross. As many of the Stations have been long occupied, the work going on there does not present much that makes them differ from our ordinary Circuit ministrations. The limited number of those who live upon the Reserves, forbid any reasonable expectation of very large additions being made to the Church. Amongst the Pagan population we are to direct our efforts: and from this source, a few conversions have recently been made.

ST. CLAIR.

Of this Mission, Brother T. FAWCETT reports:—

"Our Indians are improving. Our excellent Interpreter, H. P. Chase, says that they have cleared more land during the last year, than in the five years previous. The members generally are very regular in their attendance on the means of grace. Many of them enjoy much of the love of God and have bright prospects of heaven. Our last Quarterly Meeting was a time of great spiritual joy and gladness. Four of our members have died during the year; three of whom departed in great peace; the other died suddenly, so that we had not an opportunity of ascertaining her state of mind. Two have renounced paganism in the course of the year; one we baptized Abraham last September, who immediately sickened and died in the Lord. We have had to prune a little; twelve have been expelled or dropt; but it leaves the society in a more healthy state than before.
