Sanitary Matters.

The season has arrived when the sanitary condition of the town ought to receive attention. For the past number of years there has not been the amount of consideration given to it that there should have been. Now that we are incorporated and have the necessary officials and an efficient Board of Health, we hope to see a better condition of affairs. Considerable has been said with reference to the providing of a system of sewerage, and a number of opinions have been advanced as to the advisability of the expenditure of the amount necessary for providing the same. At any rate some time must elapse before we have such a system completed, and in the meantime the greatest possible care should be taken to have the town kept clean and in a good sanitary condition. In the spring of the year there are always a number of places that need looking after. We trust that the Board of Health and the inspectors will see to it that the town is put in a thoroughly clean and healthy condition, and that in their efforts in this direction they may have the hearty co-operation of the townspeople generally. We would like to see a more general interest taken in this and other affairs of the town by the citizens. The councillors cannot do everything. They are giving a vast amount of time and energy for the general good, and any assistance or encouragement that can be given is due them for their painstaking efforts. We feel sure that they would be glad to hear the opinions and advice of those who are qualified to advise profitably.

Town Council.

The monthly meeting of the Town Council was held on Tuesday evening. Present—The Mayor and Councillors, Messrs. Sawyer, Geo. W. Borden, Davison and Starr.

Couns. Thomson, chairman of the street com., reported that the building being erected by Messrs. Brown, Munro & Co. was encroaching on Chapel street, and that they had been notified to that effect.

Application from J. M. Toys, Harbort, for the position of policeman for the town, at a salary of about \$150; also certificate as to his qualifications, signed by J. B. North, J. W. Churchill and J. A. Taylor. Application was referred to the com. on police for further action.

Couns. Starr read a communication from Mr. Watson Bishop, of Dartmouth, replying to enquiry with reference to the best means of providing a lock-up for the town.

Mr. E. L. Collins, who was present, was given permission to address the Council relative to persons living outside the town peddling milk in the town. Bill from Est. S. R. Sleep, dating back to June, 1890, for \$18.08, was read and referred to Finance com. for investigation.

A law of that nature might be all right but to be just and equitable it should make an exception of the man who harbors a cat upon his premises in spite of all the boot-jacks, flat-irons, old boots and other such missiles he can shy at her. To tax him one dollar a year for harboring her in spite of his utmost efforts to dispense with her company and her sweet strains, would seem a good deal like adding insult to injury, or injury to insult, we scarcely know which.

The bad packing of Canadian apples is said to be militating against their popularity in England. Mr. Down, the Government agent at Bristol, reports that, to prevent Canadian goods from sinking into disrepute, it is necessary that they should be honestly packed. "Many would not large and good fruit in the ends of the barrel, and small and inferior in the middle. The trader sees the whole lot, and after he has been disappointed once or twice comes to look with misgiving on all shipments from the source of his annoyance. On the continent of Europe they do better, and are resulting thereby. In packing apples, as in other things, honesty is the best policy.

A Good Roads Bulletin.

"The country road is part of the machinery of agriculture, just as the steel track is part of the machinery of the railroad. The farm wagon should pass over the surface of the road, and every pound of effort spent in dragging heavy loads through the deep mire is a waste which every farmer should try to avoid." These words introduce a bulletin on common country roads issued by the Outrigger Agricultural department, which is directing efforts towards securing an improvement in the making and care of the public thoroughfares of the province. The text and illustrations are taken from a publication of the League of American Wheelmen, prepared by Mr. Isaac B. Potter, of New York, editor of Good Roads. Everything connected with the making of a good common road is described, including building, draining and ditching, the use of machines, surfacing and repaving. The instructions are plain and easily understood, and much profit to localities should result where municipal or other roadmakers study and follow them. There is no lack of bad roads in this province or of ignorance as to how good ones should be constructed. Possibly there is no department of the public service where such waste occurs as in connection with the work done on the money spent on our country highways. The distribution of such a pamphlet among the municipal authorities in this province would be calculated to do a good work in directing opinion in right channels on a question that is becoming more important, because the favor with which dairy farming is being received, makes good roads at all times of the year a more important consideration than ever.
