No. 6 I.T.S. RCAF Toronto, Ontario.	February 1		Normal quiet routine on the Station. R.C. and Protestant Church Parades. Movie show in the evening.	
	February 2		Ferty Medical Officers arrived to attend the first School of Aviation Medicine and were addressed by Group Captain Tice. Mrs. Colerick (Y.W.C.A.) visited the Commanding Officer and discussed entertaining of airmen at Y.W.C.A. Hostels. Seventy-four airmen arrived to take the Special Navigation Course. Wing Commander Taylor from No. 1 Training Command inspected the Equipment Section. Squadron Leader Baxter arrived to be Adjutant to the School of Aviation Medicine.	
	February 3		Great signs of activity around the Station. Decoration began on the passage-way to the Officers' Mess and No. 208 Barrack Block took shape as the carpenters raised the walls in bitter cold weather. The Station Administrative Officer was relieved of the portion of his work taken up with Works & Buildings since the opening of the Station, by the arrival of a New Works & Buildings Officer - Flying Officer E.J. Crene.	
	February 4		Squadron Leader McNutt, Armament Officer from No. 1 Training Command, ^{VISITED} lectured on Armament work with appropriate specimens of armament. Workmen began digging foundation for the new Link Trainer Building. Flight Lieutenant Goodall initiated fire practice with an unexpected alarm at 1645 hours. All buildings were cleared in eight minutes.	
	February 5		Wing Commander Chalk, P.M.O. and Flight Lieutenant Buck, his assistant, came to inspect the procedure of the School of Aviation Medicine. "Fortune" magazine photographers photographed the Low Compression chamber. Flying Officer E.E. Creeper from the training squadrons lectured the Air Cadets at Malvern Collegiate.	
	February 6		Flight Lieutenant Duthie, Works and Buildings Officer from No. 1 Training Command, visited to familiarize himself with the School set-up. Wing Commander Hanchet-Taylor lectured the army on aircraft recognition at Fort York Armouries, and was enthusiastically received. Flight Lieutenant Mason, Legal Officer from Command, lectured the School of Aviation Medicine.
