## REMANDED FOR A WEEK.

Baby Drowned or Suffocated — Death

Not Due to Wounding.

Toronto, May 23.—Little Josephine

Carr, the girl who has confessed to the

murder of the infant son of Mr. and

Mrs. William Murray, was quite calm

and self-possessed as she walked

through the hall into the Children's

Court yesterday morning. Mrs. Agnes

Whiddon was in charge of her. Mr.

T. C. Robinson, K. C., appeared on her

behalf, but she was not asked either

to plead or elect, and she will not be

asked to do so until after the inquest,

at which she is expected to give evi-

dence. She was remanded to the Chil-

dren's Shelter for a week.

At the coroner's inquest last night

the evidence cast doubt on the idea

that the girl had murdered the baby

in cold blood, and rather showed that

the death of the baby had been due to

drowning and exposure rather than to

the injuries which it would have re-

ceived had it been thrown down the

bank as Josie in her confession tells.
