others, and we cannot hurt one without injuring many others. Some of the manufacturers do not, themselves, realize this. They think if they get sufficient protection for their own industries it does not matter to them whether others are protected or not. But each prosperous industry helps to make business directly or indirectly for many others."

"It is evident," said the student, "that the workers in the varied industries of Canadian farms, forests, fisheries, factories, mines, railways and the mercantile classes dependent on them should all co-operate to secure such a thorough revision of the customs tariff that there will be adequate

protection for all."

"That is what Canada needs," said his father, "a patriotic spirit of national cooperation."
