MUTTON BROTH.—Boil a shoulder of mutton, the cheapest part of the sheep, in four quarts of water two hours. Add one onion, two turnips, cut fine, one tablespoonful of salt, and one cup of rice. Then boil an hour and a half longer; cut a little parsley, and put it in five minutes before dishing. Then the mutton can be served with drawn butter and capers.

BEEF STEW.—Six pounds of the flank of beef cut in pieces, boil in two quarts of water until quite tender. Then put in a dozen potatoes, a dozen onions, four turnips, cover it so that the steam shall not escape, salt and pepper to the taste,
