Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

NY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, except ing 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is tne sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected there with under one of the following

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother. steader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may b satisfied by such person residing

with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his perme ent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by resi

dence upon said land. months' notice in writing Six should be given the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
