The apple crop throughout the  
Dominion, though seriously affected  
by recent draught, is still likely to  
average better than last year. The  
best reports, according to the Depart-  
ment of Agriculture, come from New  
Brunswick and Prince Edward Island  
where there is a heavy set for all  
varieties. Baldwins and Kings prom-  
ise well in Nova Scotia, but in other  
varieties there has been a heavy drop  
reducing prospects to about 10 per  
cent. in excess of last year.

In Eastern Canada provincial and  
municipal authorities are engaging in  
the work of tree planting both for  
timber production and to hold sands  
from drifting over good land in West-  
ern Canada, dozens of cities and  
towns are planting trees along streets  
and in parks, while thousands of farm-  
ers are setting out shelter-belts and  
wind breaks. This increased interest  
augurs well for forest protection, be-  
cause people who value trees enough  
to plant them are not going to al-  
low growing forests to be burned up  
without demanding a reason.

Losses estimated at millions of  
dollars are said to have been suffered  
in the province through the recent  
forest fires. Experts who have been  
engaged in preparing estimates have  
not yet supplied the forestry branch  
of the department of lands and for-  
ests with any official figures, but it  
was learned from a reliable source  
that in the Abitibi region alone where  
forest fires have certainly not taken  
the extensive toll of these immedi-  
ately northern sections, over \$800,-  
000 worth of forests have been de-  
stroyed.

For cool deliberate nerve the band-  
its of to-day, who rob banks and busi-  
ness places and murder when they  
are cornered, deserve to be handled  
without gloves. Neither the individ-  
ual nor his home are immune. In  
broad daylight, along a street or pub-  
lic thoroughfare these vulture pounce  
upon their victims and regardless of  
the risk they run, carry out their pro-  
gram. There should be no tinkering  
with Justice, as such conduct should  
receive no quarter and fellows taught  
the lesson that the way of the trans-  
gressor is hard.—Brussels Post.

At the present time a series of ad-  
vertisements is appearing in our col-  
umns tending to educate the people to  
conserve our forest wealth through  
fire prevention. The destruction  
wrought by forest fires was brought  
home very closely to the weekly news  
paper publishers who recently toured  
through Northern Ontario and in the  
Province of British Columbia. Miles  
of valuable timber land has been laid  
waste by fire in both these Provinces  
the value of which cannot be estimat-  
ed. The timber resources of Canada  
cannot be too carefully conserved and  
a perusal of the advertisements refer-  
red to is most strongly urged, espe-  
cially in our own district what  
forest remains should be conserved  
and new wood lots should be planted  
out.

A heavy downpour of rain, which  
fell just as people were starting to  
move out of their homes, was all  
that saved the northern part of the  
town of St. Marys from destruction  
last Saturday night, when the big  
chopping mill of the St. Marys Mill-  
ing Company was completely destroy-  
ed by fire. The blaze was the worst  
in the history of the town, and calls  
for help were telephoned to Stratford.  
When the rain came, however, it was  
so heavy and lasted so long that the  
message was not to come. It reached  
them just as they were starting with  
equipment. The mill, which is own-  
ed by Mr. H. L. Rice, was fully cov-  
ered by insurance. The loss will be  
about \$100,000. Mr. Rice stated that  
he will rebuild as soon as possible.

Owing to the high cost of the Amer-  
ican dollar, South American cus-

### NEW SCHEME FOR HYDRO

An entirely new scheme for Hydro  
power transmission has been worked  
out by the Hydro electric commission  
engineers for submission to the Ont-  
ario Government in connection with  
the plan to distribute power in rural  
districts. A system of underground  
transmission lines is now believed to  
be the solution of the rural power prob-  
lem and among the advantages which  
will be outlined to the Government  
are those of cheaper installation,  
cheaper upkeep and facility of con-  
struction. If the underground power  
extension scheme is adopted by the  
Government it will be a complete de-  
parture from Hydro precedent. The  
scheme has its limitations, including  
for instance, the impossibility of lay-  
ing an underground extension system  
through rocky ground. But in good  
farming districts the Hydro engineers  
have estimated, underground cables
