## TWO HEROES HOME FROM THE FRONT

Corp. Allen, Veteran of Boer War and Pte. Horsnell Return to City.

Two more of Brantford's heroes were welcomed back from the front last evening, when Corp. Allen of the Princess Pals and Pte. R. W. Horsnell of the C.M.R. returned to the city, inviolate from the front. They were met at the station, where despite the inclement weather, a crowd of good proportion was assembled to greet them.

By Ald. Dowling, chairman of the Soldiers' Aid Commission and Mr. W. F. Cockshutt, M.P., who addressed a few words of welcome to the two returning men, following which they were at once conveyed to their homes.

Corp. Allen, Lance-Corporal Thomas Allen, has the unique distinction of having gone through battle after battle unscathed only to be smashed physically by horses stamped by shell fire. The returned corporal, whose home is in this city, where he has come to visit his sister, but who is listed in Edmonton, is badly battered and bruised as the result of his experiences, and the hearing is completely gone from his right ear. Of the exploits of the P.F.C.L.I. men Corp. Allen could tell a great deal, and of his own experiences on the field he could say much, but with the characteristic modesty of the man who has been "through it," he states only that he was present when "The Pals" made their last stand at St. Eloi, and that his great regret is that unmanageable horses caused his removal from the field. Corp. Allen, who also served through the Boer war with Remington's Scouts, would rather talk of his comrades than about himself, and referring to that gallant London man, Major Hugh Niven, he states that no finer soldier ever took the field and that no decorations were ever better earned than the D.S.O. and Military Cross awarded the plucky little officer from Ontario. The latter he adds, is still on duty with about 6 or seven others, who went out from Ottawa under the colors fashioned by the hands of Connaught's royal daughter.

Pte. Horsnell, of 111 Alfred street, is a single man and a member of the Canadian Mounted Rifles, having been wounded while at the front with them in June last. He enlisted in January, 1915. He still bears traces of his injuries, being very lame.

### News Notes

Samuel Compers, at the Federation of Labor convention, which is attended by "Big Four" railroad brotherhood chiefs, declares labor is prepared for a "war to the end with combinations of capital seeking to crush unions."

The Adamson eight-hour law for railroad employees will be pushed for decision by the Supreme Court before January 1, when it becomes effective, under an agreement between the government officials and the railroads.

An agreement between the American and Mexican Joint Commissions at Atlantic City is halted by the presentation of counter proposals by Luis Cabrera to the Lane demand for the right for American troops to follow a "hot trail" across the border of New Mexico.

As the result of the burning of the home of Joseph Rasse in Fairfield, Conn., yesterday, the father, mother and a three-year-old girl are believed to be dying; two small boys were burned to death and a baby born to Mrs. Rasse in the hospital here died. The fire started from an explosion of kerosene.
